THAT the National Assembly denounce the violence and abuse suffered by hundreds of innocent civilians and the rape and genital mutilation of women and girls in the eastern part of the Democratic Republic of Congo;

THAT it urge the Québec and Canadian governments, as well as the international community, to rally more pro-actively to end these repeated human rights violations and to provide assistance to displaced populations in danger.

By leave of the Assembly, a debate arose thereon.

The debate being concluded, the motion was carried.

Mr. Bonnardel (Granby), together with Mr. Marceau (Rousseau) and Mrs. David (Gouin), moved a motion concerning Quebecers' tax burden; this motion could not be debated for want of unanimous consent.

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By leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Order 185, Mrs. Massé (Sainte-Marie–Saint-Jacques), together with Mrs. Vallée, Minister of Justice and Minister responsible for the Status of Women, and Mrs. Poirier (Hochelaga-Maisonneuve), moved:

THAT the National Assembly applaud the valuable work being done by L’R des centres de femmes du Québec, a Québec-wide network of women’s centres, which is celebrating its 30th anniversary this year;

THAT it highlight the importance of the L’R network’s mission and overall approach as tools for supporting women in asserting themselves as individuals and as a group.

By leave of the Assembly, the motion was carried.

Notices of Proceedings in Committees

Mr. Sklavounos, Deputy Government House Leader, convened the following committee:

- the Committee on Health and Social Services, to continue its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill 20, An Act to enact the Act to promote access to family medicine and specialized medicine services and to amend various legislative provisions relating to assisted procreation.

ORDERS OF THE DAY

Government Bills

Passage in principle

Mrs. David, Minister of Culture and Communications, moved that Bill 47, An Act to modernize the governance of Bibliothèque et Archives nationales du Québec, do now pass in principle.

After debate thereon, the motion was carried, and Bill 47 was accordingly passed in principle.

Mrs. Vien, Deputy Government House Leader, moved that Bill 47 be referred to the Committee on Culture and Education for clause-by-clause consideration.

The motion was carried.

Government Motions

The Assembly held the debate on the motion that arose from the tabling of the Québec-India social security agreement, signed in Québec City on 26 November 2013, on 26 May 2015 by Mrs. St-Pierre, Minister of International Relations and La Francophonie.

This motion reads as follows:

THAT, pursuant to section 22.3 of the *Act respecting the Ministère des Relations internationales*, the National Assembly approve the Québec-India social security agreement, signed in Québec City on 26 November 2013.

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Mrs. Gaudreault, Second Vice-President, informed the Assembly of the allocation of speaking time for the proceedings with respect to this limited debate: 57 minutes to the parliamentary group forming the Government; 33 minutes 32 seconds to the parliamentary group forming the Official Opposition; 23 minutes 28 seconds to the Second Opposition Group; and 6 minutes to the independent Members. Within this framework, any time not used by the independent Members or by any of the parliamentary groups shall be redistributed among the parliamentary groups in the proportions established above. Lastly, individual addresses shall not be limited.

After debate thereon, the motion was carried. Accordingly, this commitment was approved.

Mrs. Vien, Deputy Government House Leader, moved the adjournment of the Assembly until Tuesday, 9 June 2015, at 1.45 o'clock p.m.
