The Assembly proceeded to Oral Question Period.

Motions Without Notice

By leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Order 185, Mr. Bédard (Chicoutimi), together with Mr. Jolin-Barrette (Borduas) and Mrs. Massé (Sainte-Marie–Saint-Jacques), moved:

THAT the National Assembly denounce the assault perpetrated against a young homosexual at the Festival Western de St-Tite;

THAT the National Assembly recall the importance of combatting homophobia, transphobia and all other sexual stereotypes that exist in our society.

By leave of the Assembly, a debate arose thereon.

The debate being concluded, the motion was carried.

By leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Order 185, Mrs. Lavallée (Repentigny), together with Mr. Pagé (Labelle) and Mrs. David (Gouin), moved:

THAT the National Assembly demand that the Ministère de la Famille tighten its criteria for verifying the judicial records of persons applying for childcare permits (subsidized or unsubsidized), by including the members of the person's immediate family.

By leave of the Assembly, the motion was carried.

By leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Order 185, Mrs. David (Gouin), together with Mr. Moreau, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Land Occupancy, Mr. Lisée (Rosemont) and Mr. Laframboise (Blainville), moved:

THAT the National Assembly acknowledge the report of the Director of Public Health for the Montréal region which points out that seniors, especially those living alone, tenants, recent immigrants and big-city dwellers are more likely than others to live in unaffordable housing; THAT the National Assembly invite the Government to continue investing in renovating and upgrading dwellings to ensure they meet health standards, to maintain its rent subsidy program, and to continue investing in the construction of social and community dwellings;

THAT, lastly, it reiterate the motion, adopted unanimously on 21 May 2015, inviting the Federal Government to put an end to disinvestment in social housing.

By leave of the Assembly, the motion was carried.

Notices of Proceedings in Committees

Mr. Sklavounos, Deputy Government House Leader, convened the following committees:

- the Committee on Institutions, to conclude its public hearings within the framework of special consultations on Bill 59, An Act to enact the Act to prevent and combat hate speech and speech inciting violence and to amend various legislative provisions to better protect individuals; and then, undertake public hearings within the framework of special consultations on Bill 51, An Act mainly to make the administration of justice more efficient and fines for minors more deterrent;
- the Committee on Health and Social Services, to continue its clause-byclause consideration of Bill 20, An Act to enact the Act to promote access to family medicine and specialized medicine services and to amend various legislative provisions relating to assisted procreation;
- the Committee on Agriculture, Fisheries, Energy and Natural Resources, to continue its public hearings within the framework of special consultations on Bill 54, An Act to improve the legal situation of animals.

Mr. Gendron, Third Vice-President, gave the following notices:

- the Committee on Public Finance shall hold a deliberative meeting to discuss the possibility of carrying out an order of initiative;
- the Committee on Public Administration shall hold a public meeting to hear the Ministère du Développement durable, de l'Environnement et de la Lutte contre les changements climatiques on Chapter 3 of the Auditor General's Spring 2015 report; and then, hold a deliberative meeting to discuss the observations, conclusions and recommendations, if any, following this hearing.

ORDERS OF THE DAY

Government Bills

Passage in Principle

Mrs. Charlebois, Minister for Rehabilitation, Youth Protection and Public Health, moved that Bill 44, An Act to bolster tobacco control, do now pass in principle.

After debate thereon, the motion was carried, and Bill 44 was accordingly passed in principle.

Mr. Sklavounos, Deputy Government House Leader, moved that Bill 44 be referred to the Committee on Health and Social Services for clause-by-clause consideration.

The motion was carried.

At 12.56 o'clock p.m., at the request of Mr. Sklavounos, Deputy Government House Leader, and by leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Order 20, Mr. Gendron, Third Vice-President, suspended the proceedings until 3.00 o'clock p.m.

The proceedings resumed at 3.00 o'clock p.m.

Business Standing in the Name of Members in Opposition

Mr. Roberge (Chambly) moved:

THAT the National Assembly acknowledge the many budget cuts the Liberal Government has made to direct student services;

THAT it recognize that education is not merely a government expenditure item but a national priority, and that budget cuts in this regard have adverse, lasting effects on our children's success:

THAT it demand that the Liberal Government immediately put an end to all budget restraint measures affecting student services.

Mr. Ouimet, First Vice-President, informed the Assembly of the allocation of speaking time for the proceedings with respect to this limited debate: 10 minutes to the mover of the motion for his reply; approximately 51 minutes 30 seconds to the parliamentary group forming the Government; approximately 30 minutes 30 seconds to the parliamentary group forming the Official Opposition; approximately 21 minutes to the Second Opposition Group; and 7 minutes to the independent Members, subject to a maximum of 2 minutes for the Member for Arthabaska. Within this framework, any time not used by the independent Members or by a parliamentary group shall be redistributed among the parliamentary groups in the proportions established above. Lastly, individual addresses shall not be limited.

A debate arose thereon.

The debate being concluded, the question was put on this motion, and a recorded division was thereupon demanded.

The motion was negatived on the following vote.
