By leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Order 185, Mr. Daoust, Minister of the Economy, Innovation and Exports, together with Mrs. David, Minister of Culture and Communications, Mr. Therrien (Sanguinet), Mrs. Samson (Iberville) and Mrs. David (Gouin), moved:

THAT it applaud "Prix du Québec" recipients—women and men having contributed significantly to the individual and collective enrichment of Québec society and to Québec's influence the world over.

THAT the Minister of Transport be a member of the said Committee during its proceedings with respect to this order of reference.

By leave of the Assembly, the motion was carried.

Notices of Proceedings in Committees

Mr. Sklavounos, Deputy Government House Leader, convened the following committees:

- the Committee on Institutions shall hold a deliberative meeting to establish its observations, conclusions and recommendations following its hearing of the Anti-Corruption Commissioner and the Director of Criminal and Penal Prosecutions.

ORDERS OF THE DAY

Government Bills

Passage in Principle

The Assembly resumed the debate, which had been adjourned on 17 November 2015, on the motion moved by Mrs. Vallée, Minister of Justice, that Bill 59, An Act to enact the Act to prevent and combat hate speech and speech inciting violence and to amend various legislative provisions to better protect individuals, do now pass in principle.

The debate being concluded, the question was put on this motion, and a recorded division was thereupon demanded.

At the request of Mr. Sklavounos, Deputy Government House Leader, the division was deferred until Routine Proceedings on the next sitting day.

Mrs. Vien, Minister of Tourism, moved that Bill 67, An Act mainly to improve the regulation of tourist accommodation, do now pass in principle.

After debate thereon, the motion was carried, and Bill 67 was accordingly passed in principle.

Mr. Sklavounos, Deputy Government House Leader, moved that Bill 67 be referred to the Committee on Labour and the Economy for clause-by-clause consideration.

The motion was carried.

Report Stage

The Assembly took into consideration the report from the Committee on Public Finance on its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill 73, An Act respecting mainly the implementation of recommendations of the pension committee of certain public sector pension plans.

After debate thereon, the report was concurred in.

Passage

Mrs. Vallée, Minister of Justice, moved the passage of Bill 51, An Act mainly to make the administration of justice more efficient and fines for minors more deterrent.

A debate arose thereon.

At 12.59 o'clock p.m., Mr. Ouimet, First Vice-President, suspended the proceedings until 3.00 o'clock p.m.

Accordingly, pursuant to Standing Order 97, the debate on the motion moved by Mrs. Vallée, Minister of Justice, was adjourned.

The proceedings resumed at 3.02 o'clock p.m.

Business Standing in the Name of Members in Opposition

The Assembly resumed the debate, which had been adjourned on 11 June 2015, on the motion moved by Mr. Charette (Deux-Montagnes) for the passage in principle of Bill 393, An Act to provide a framework for appointments to certain senior positions and to standardize certain aspects of the appointment of administrative judges and decision-makers.

By leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Order 209, Mr. Charette (Deux-Montagnes) took the floor a second time in the course of this debate.

By leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Order 209, Mr. Fournier, Government House Leader, took the floor a second time in the course of this debate.

The debate being concluded, the question was put on this motion, and a recorded division was thereupon demanded.

The motion was negatived on the following vote:

Accordingly, the passage in principle of Bill 393 was rejected.

Government Bills

Passage

Passage in Principle

Mr. Leitão, Minister of Finance, moved that Bill 69, An Act to give effect to fiscal measures announced mainly in the Budget Speech delivered on 26 March 2015, do now pass in principle.

After debate thereon, the motion was carried on division, and Bill 69 was accordingly passed in principle.

Mr. Sklavounos, Deputy Government House Leader, moved that Bill 69 be referred to the Committee on Public Finance for clause-by-clause consideration.
