# **Motions Without Notice**

Mrs. Maltais (Taschereau), together with Mrs. Roy (Montarville), moved a motion concerning Bill 59, An Act to enact the Act to prevent and combat hate speech and speech inciting violence and to amend various legislative provisions to better protect individuals; this motion could not be debated for want of unanimous consent.

Mrs. David (Gouin) moved a motion concerning the tax treatment of senior managers of Québec companies; this motion could not be debated for want of unanimous consent.

Pursuant to Standing Order 129, Mr. Bergeron, Chief Official Opposition Whip, moved:

THAT the Member for Chicoutimi be named a member of the Committee on Public Administration;

THAT the Member for Rimouski be named a member of the Committee on Planning and the Public Domain in substitution of the Member for Jonquière;

THAT the Member for Richelieu be named a member of the Committee on Labour and the Economy in substitution of the Member for Verchères;

THAT the Member for Pointe-aux-Trembles be named a member of the Committee on Public Finance in substitution of the Member for Gaspé;

THAT the Member for Rimouski be named a member of the Committee on Citizen Relations in substitution of the Member for Richelieu;

THAT these changes take effect immediately.

The motion was carried.

#### **Notices of Proceedings in Committees**

Mr. Sklavounos, Deputy Government House Leader, convened the following committees:

— the Committee on Institutions, to continue its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill 64, Firearms Registration Act; and then, continue its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill 59, An Act to enact the Act to prevent and combat hate speech and speech inciting violence and to amend various legislative provisions to better protect individuals;

- the Committee on Labour and the Economy, to continue its clause-byclause consideration of Bill 70, An Act to allow a better match between training and jobs and to facilitate labour market entry;
- the Committee on Planning and the Public Domain, to continue its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill 83, An Act to amend various municipal-related legislative provisions concerning such matters as political financing;

# **ORDERS OF THE DAY**

# **Government Bills**

#### Passage in Principle

Mr. Leitão, Minister responsible for Government Administration and Ongoing Program Review and Chair of the Conseil du trésor, moved that Bill 97, An Act to amend certain Acts establishing pension plans applicable to public sector employees, do now pass in principle.

After debate thereon, the motion was carried, and Bill 97 was accordingly passed in principle.

Mr. Sklavounos, Deputy Government House Leader, moved that Bill 97 be referred to the Committee on Public Finance for clause-by-clause consideration.

The motion was carried.

# Report Stage

The Assembly took into consideration the report from the Committee on Public Finance on its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill 88, An Act respecting development of the small-scale alcoholic beverage industry.

After debate thereon, the report was concurred in.

# Passage

Mr. Daoust, Minister of Transport, Sustainable Mobility and Transport Electrification, moved the passage of Bill 76, An Act to modify mainly the organization and governance of shared transportation in the Montréal metropolitan area (*modified title*).

A debate arose thereon.

Pursuant to Standing Order 100, Mr. Sklavounos, Deputy Government House Leader, moved the adjournment of the debate.

The motion was carried.

Accordingly, the debate on the motion for passage of Bill 76 was adjourned.

At 11.52 o'clock a.m., at the request of Mr. Sklavounos, Deputy Government House Leader, and by leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Order 20, Mr. Ouimet, First Vice-President, suspended the proceedings until 3.00 o'clock p.m.

The proceedings resumed at 3.00 o'clock p.m.

# **Business Standing in the Name of Members in Opposition**

Mrs. Massé (Sainte-Marie-Saint-Jacques) moved:

THAT the National Assembly recognize that, in 2016, only an hourly wage of \$15 or more ensures a viable income for full-time employees;

THAT the National Assembly pledge to pass a law before the end of the current legislature, establishing the hourly minimum wage at \$15 and stipulating the criteria for its annual increase.

Mrs. Gaudreault, Second Vice-President, informed the Assembly of the allocation of speaking time for the proceedings with respect to this limited debate: 10 minutes to the mover of the motion for her reply; approximately 46 minutes 30 seconds to the parliamentary group forming the Government; approximately 27 minutes 31 seconds to the parliamentary group forming the Official Opposition; approximately 18 minutes 59 seconds to the Second Opposition Group; and 17 minutes to the independent Members. Within this framework, any time not used by the independent Members or by a parliamentary group shall be redistributed among the parliamentary groups in the proportions established above. Lastly, individual addresses shall not be limited.

A debate arose thereon.

At the end of his address, Mr. Rochon (Richelieu) moved:

THAT the motion moved by Mrs. Massé (Sainte-Marie-Saint-Jacques) be amended as follows:

By replacing, in the second paragraph, the words "pass a law" by the words "consider a bill".

The motion, as amended, would read as follows:

THAT the National Assembly recognize that, in 2016, only an hourly wage of \$15 or more ensures a viable income for full-time employees;

THAT the National Assembly pledge to consider a bill before the end of the current legislature, establishing the hourly minimum wage at \$15 and stipulating the criteria for its annual increase.

The debate continued on the main motion moved by Mrs. Massé (Sainte-Marie–Saint-Jacques) and on the amendment motion moved by Mr. Rochon (Richelieu), subject to the permission of its author.

Pursuant to Standing Order 98.1, Mrs. Massé (Sainte-Marie–Saint-Jacques) refused the amendment proposed by Mr. Rochon (Richelieu).

The debate continued on the main motion moved by Mrs. Massé (Sainte-Marie-Saint-Jacques).

The debate being concluded, the question was put on the motion, and a recorded division was thereupon demanded.

At the request of Mr. Sklavounos, Deputy Government House Leader, the division was deferred until Routine Proceedings on the next sitting day.
