# **Complaints of Breach of Privilege or Contempt and Personal Explanations**

The President ruled on the point of privilege or contempt raised by the Official Opposition House Leader on 28 November 2017 concerning Mr. Marc-André Fortier, former President and CEO of the Société immobilière du Québec, who allegedly acted in contempt of Parliament on 13 June 2007 by giving false or incomplete testimony before the Committee on Public Finance on the sale of immovables by the Société immobilière du Québec.

# RULING FROM THE CHAIR

Parliamentary jurisprudence holds that, when a third party is alleged to have given false or incomplete testimony before a parliamentary committee, thus acting in contempt of Parliament, the criterion of knowingly seeking to mislead the Assembly or a committee must be assessed in greater detail. In a recent ruling on a similar subject, the Chair referred to New Zealand jurisprudence, which specifies that, to establish contempt of Parliament from a third party's testimony, intent to deceive the committee must be very clear. The President of the Assembly further recalled that two elements are necessary for a question raised with respect to a third party to be declared receivable under section 55 of the *Act respecting the National Assembly*. First, there must be compelling evidence that the witness did, in fact, give false or incomplete testimony. Second, it is essential to ascertain fraudulent intent, or intent to deceive or hinder parliamentary proceedings, in the alleged false or incomplete testimony.

The Official Opposition House Leader began by calling into question the accuracy of the reasons Mr. Fortier gave the parliamentarians to justify the SIQ's choice to sell three immovables. According to the House Leader, the immovables were acquired in 2000 with a view to replacing private tenants by public bodies through attrition.

In his testimony, Mr. Fortier recalled that the immovables were acquired [TRANSLATION] "in 2000, I repeat, with the goal of concentrating the public service on Parliament Hill and in downtown Montréal". However, he noted that the Government's aims had shifted since that time. He also recalled the Minister of Finance's comments, in the Budget Speech a few weeks before Mr. Fortier's testimony, announcing the Government's intention to sell these immovables and channel the proceeds from the sale into the Generations Fund. Mr. Fortier added that the SIQ had conducted studies on the immovables' value and that the real estate market was highly favourable to selling. Finally, Mr. Fortier indicated that the immovables should not have been acquired because they did not fall within the scope of the SIQ's mission.

Some of the elements on which Mr. Fortier's testimony is based seem to be opinion or an expression of his personal views. There also seems to be a discrepancy between the reasons cited for acquiring the buildings in 2000 and the SIQ's wish to divest itself of them seven years later. In his testimony, Mr. Fortier explained the reasons for this change. There appears to be a difference between the term of the leases entered into in March 2008, after negotiations, and the term that Mr. Fortier reported to the parliamentarians in his testimony. Another discrepancy apparently concerned the terms and conditions of the retrocession clause for the spaces freed up by the SIQ. The evidence submitted shows that the time frame between the date of the sale and the date the retrocession clause came into force more than doubled between the beginning and end of the negotiations.

However, it is important to contextualize Mr. Fortier's testimony according to the progression of the sale of each immovable. The SIQ was just beginning the process of selling the immovables when Mr. Fortier gave his testimony. Looking at the evidence submitted, we can see that the formal negotiations concerning the sale of the immovables took place several months after Mr. Fortier testified.

Of course, there appear to be discrepancies between what Mr. Fortier said in June 2007 before the committee and what occurred at the time of the sale in March 2008. Referring to the Auditor General's report, we may well wonder whether Mr. Fortier's testimony was indeed designed to provide the Committee members with the best possible explanations regarding the sale of the three immovables and the target goals.

As the Chair has already stated, the parliamentarians are right to demand rigour, proper preparation and care in giving the best possible testimony from persons who take part in committee proceedings, even more so in the case of deputy ministers or heads of public bodies. It is understandable that parliamentarians are concerned when they are told one thing in committee and then something completely different occurs.

That being said, despite Mr. Fortier's testimony, which may seem flawed in some respects, and despite the discrepancies between the testimony given in June 2007 and the results obtained at the end of the sale process in March 2008, nothing allows the Chair to conclude from the evidence submitted that Mr. Fortier had a clear intent to deceive the committee.

Consequently, the Chair cannot conclude that Mr. Fortier acted prima facie in contempt of Parliament.
