Complaints of Breach of Privilege or Contempt and Personal Explanations

The President ruled on the point of privilege or contempt raised by the Official Opposition House Leader on 17 May 2018, in which the latter alleged that the Minister responsible for Access to Information and the Reform of Democratic Institutions acted in contempt of Parliament earlier that day, during a technical briefing session, by giving journalists copies of Bill 179, An Act to amend the Act respecting Access to documents held by public bodies and the Protection of personal information, before introducing the bill in the Assembly. More specifically, the Official Opposition House Leader indicated that the Minister's office had allegedly held a technical briefing session on Thursday morning from 9.00 a.m. to 10.00 a.m., at which time journalists allegedly received copies of the entire bill with the mention "SOUS EMBARGO (under embargo)" on each page, almost one hour before the bill was introduced in the Assembly.

RULING FROM THE CHAIR

Regarding the parallel drawn, in arguments on this matter, between the case at hand, in which a bill under embargo was allegedly distributed to journalists before it was introduced in the Assembly, and in-camera meetings in the budget context, parliamentary jurisprudence is clear that budget speech leaks, while deplorable, do not involve parliamentary privilege and cannot constitute contempt of Parliament. This is a key difference from the case at hand, which concerns disclosing a bill's contents before introducing it in the Assembly.

Moreover, journalists and, especially, Members participate in in-camera budget meetings. The participation of the Opposition groups' finance critics stems from the fact that they have 10 minutes to make their comments right after the Minister of Finance gives the Budget Speech, pursuant to Standing Order 271. Consequently, the fact that budget-related information is disclosed in-camera before being introduced publicly in the Assembly is a well-established tradition that takes the Members' role into account, allows them to exercise their government oversight duties and gives them access to information that is useful for understanding complex aspects of a budget before having to speak publicly and give opinions about it.

Some arguments raised the point that technical briefing sessions are held at other times in order to privately communicate information that is not yet officially tabled in the Assembly, for example, when reports from persons designated by the National Assembly are about to be tabled. This is another example of a practice where information is given to Members, who accept the procedure, allowing them to become aware of the key aspects of sometimes very lengthy documents before they are made public, thus enabling the Members to do their job properly.

The Chair therefore concludes that both in-camera budget meetings and technical briefing sessions on documents not yet released publicly stem from a well-established tradition accepted by the Members and help the Assembly's proceedings run smoothly by preserving the Members' role. These are not government-initiated communications exercises designed to deliver the Government's message to hand-picked recipients first, a practice that could influence media coverage once a measure is made public.

In the case at hand, because only journalists allegedly participated in a technical briefing session in which copies of Bill 179 were allegedly distributed, no parallels can be drawn with the above-mentioned examples.

What about the aspects specific to a situation such as this one?

In the past, the Chair has stated that, despite the fundamental role journalists play in our democracy, parliamentarians must be the first to receive all information needed to perform their legislative duties. The Chair has also, on several occasions, recalled the importance of respecting this principle by calling on all parliamentarians, especially Cabinet Members and their staff, to be very careful when communicating information intended first and foremost for the Assembly, out of deference to the Assembly and its Members.

In legislative matters, parliamentary jurisprudence has always been categorical: Members must be the first to be informed of the details regarding a bill's contents, out of respect for their role as legislators.

Allowing journalists to be informed of a bill's contents before informing the Members could, in fact, put the latter in an awkward position. For example, when questioned by journalists and asked for their opinion, Members might actually have less information than the journalists do on subjects which must be discussed in the Assembly first. Clearly, no one would advocate such an imbalance.

The Chair also recalls that the legislative process, as set out in the Standing Orders, generally provides for one week between the time a bill is introduced and the time it is passed in principle, to allow Members to substantiate their viewpoint before having to debate the bill's expediency, principles and merits as well as alternative means of achieving its purpose.

The Chair does not deny the Government's recognized right to inform the public about its policies and programs, or about the measures it intends to adopt. The Government may also hold technical briefing sessions to explain measures contained in a bill not only to journalists, but also to the Members. However, this briefing should take place after the bill has been introduced in the Assembly, not before, out of respect for the Members' role in the legislative process.

Contempt of Parliament is any act or omission that discredits or hinders the proceedings of the Assembly or its Committees or the duties of its Members. In a 1993 ruling, the Chair concluded that government departments' and agencies' failure to table their activity reports constituted prima facie contempt of Parliament as this could have hindered the Members' ability to perform their parliamentary duties. Similarly, in the case at hand, disclosing the bill before it was tabled in the Assembly discredited the Members' legislative role and could have hindered the Members' ability to do their job properly.

In the case in question, the Minister herself admitted that the bill's contents had been disclosed before the Members could be informed. The Chair stresses and also applauds the fact that she expressed her most sincere regrets regarding this situation in the Assembly.

In a recent House of Commons of Canada ruling regarding very similar facts, Speaker Regan concluded that disclosing a bill's contents to the media before introducing it in the House is, prima facie, an admissible point of privilege, despite the fact that the Chief Government Whip acknowledged the seriousness of the matter and apologized wholeheartedly.

This is the Chair's conclusion in the case at hand. Under the circumstances, despite the regret expressed by the Minister, the Chair has no choice but to conclude that the point of privilege or contempt raised by the Official Opposition House Leader constitutes prima facie contempt of Parliament.

Oral Questions and Answers

The Assembly proceeded to Oral Question Period.

At the request of the President, Mr. Barrette, Minister of Health and Social Services, withdrew certain words deemed unparliamentary.

Business Having Precedence

Motions relating to breaches of privilege or contempt

The Assembly took into consideration the report from the Committee on the National Assembly on the next steps in the inquiry arising from the motion moved by Mr. Surprenant (Groulx) pursuant to Standing Orders 324 to 327.

After debate thereon, the question was put on the report, and a recorded division was thereupon demanded.

At the request of Mr. Tanguay, Deputy Government House Leader, the division was deferred until Routine Proceedings on the next sitting day.

Government Bills

Report Stage

The Assembly took into consideration the report from the Committee on Public Finance on its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill 141, An Act mainly to improve the regulation of the financial sector, the protection of deposits of money and the operation of financial institutions, together with the amendments transmitted by Mr. Leitão, Minister of Finance, and Mr. Bonnardel (Granby).

The amendments were declared in order.

After debate thereon, the amendments proposed by Mr. Leitão, Minister of Finance, were carried.

The amendments proposed by Mr. Bonnardel (Granby) were negatived.

The report, as amended, was concurred in.

At 12.59 o'clock p.m., Mrs. Gaudreault, Second Vice-President, suspended the proceedings until 3.00 o'clock p.m.

The proceedings resumed at 3.00 o'clock p.m.

Passage

Mr. Leitão, Minister of Finance, moved the passage of Bill 150, An Act to better regulate the digital economy as regards e-commerce, remunerated passenger transportation and tourist accommodation and to amend various legislative provisions (modified title).

A debate arose thereon.

During the debate, Mr. Leitão, Minister of Finance, moved that Bill 150 be referred to a Committee of the Whole for consideration of the amendments that he specified.

The motion was carried.

Mrs. Vien, Deputy Government House Leader, moved that the Assembly resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole.

The motion was carried.

Committee of the Whole

The amendments by Mr. Leitão, Minister of Finance, to Bill 150, including an amendment to the title, were considered and then carried in Committee of the Whole.

The Committee of the Whole undertook examination of the amendments to Bill 150.

The debate continued on the motion for the passage of Bill 150, An Act to improve the performance of the Société de l'assurance automobile du Québec, to better regulate the digital economy as regards e-commerce, remunerated passenger transportation and tourist accommodation and to amend various legislative provisions (modified title).

The debate being concluded, the motion was carried and, accordingly, Bill 150 was passed.

Passage

Mrs. Weil, Minister responsible for Access to Information and the Reform of Democratic Institutions, moved the passage of Bill 140, An Act respecting the services available to a former Prime Minister.

After debate thereon, the motion was carried and, accordingly, Bill 140 was passed.

Debates on Reports from Committees

The Assembly took into consideration the report from the Committee on Planning and the Public Domain, which held public hearings on 14 May 2018 within the framework of special consultations on the order of initiative on access to local financial services in the regions. The report contains observations, conclusions and four recommendations.

Mr. Gendron, Third Vice-President, informed the Assembly of the allocation of speaking time for the proceedings with respect to this debate: 55 minutes to the parliamentary group forming the Government; 31 minutes 26 seconds to the parliamentary group forming the Official Opposition; 23 minutes 34 seconds to the Second Opposition Group; and 10 minutes to the independent Members, subject to a maximum of 2 minutes each for the Member for Gaspé, the Member for Groulx and the Member for Vachon, and 6 minutes to the Members of Québec solidaire. Within this framework, any time not used by the independent Members or by a parliamentary group shall be redistributed among the parliamentary groups in the proportions established above. Lastly, individual addresses shall not be limited.

The debate arose thereon.

The debate expired and, pursuant to Standing Order 95, no question was put.

Mr. Tanguay, Deputy Government House Leader, moved the adjournment of the Assembly until Wednesday, 13 June 2018 at 9.40 o'clock a.m.
