The Assembly proceeded to Oral Question Period.

#### **Motions Without Notice**

By leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Orders 84.3 and 185, Mr. Legault, Premier, together with Mr. Arcand, Leader of the Official Opposition, Mrs. Massé, Leader of the Second Opposition Group, Mr. Bérubé, Leader of the Third Opposition Group, Mr. Ouellette (Chomedey) and Mrs. Fournier (Marie-Victorin), moved:

> THAT the National Assembly of Québec express its profound sadness at the passing of Mr. Jacques Chirac, former Prime Minister and President of the French Republic;

> THAT it pay tribute to the extraordinary career and achievements of this French President, who also served as Prime Minister of France and Mayor of Paris;

> THAT it applaud this great friend of Québec, and offer its most sincere condolences to his family and friends, and to the people of France;

> THAT, lastly, the Members of this Assembly observe a minute of silence in his memory.

By leave of the Assembly, a debate arose thereon.

The debate being concluded, the motion was carried.

At the request of Mrs. Gaudreault, Third Vice-President, the Assembly observed a minute of silence.

Mr. LeBel (Rimouski), together with Mrs. Sauvé (Fabre), Mr. Leduc (Hochelaga-Maisonneuve), Mr. Ouellette (Chomedey) and Mrs. Fournier (Marie-Victorin), moved a motion on the delivery of the solidarity tax credit; this motion could not be debated for want of unanimous consent.

Mrs. Labrie (Sherbrooke), together with Mrs. Rizqy (Saint-Laurent), Mrs. Hivon (Joliette), Mr. Ouellette (Chomedey) and Mrs. Fournier (Marie-Victorin), moved a motion on Québec school boards; this motion could not be debated for want of unanimous consent.

Mrs. Montpetit (Maurice-Richard), together with Mr. Ouellette (Chomedey), moved a motion on Québec's expertise in environmental matters; this motion could not be debated for want of unanimous consent.

By leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Order 185, Mrs. Fournier (Marie-Victorin), together with Mrs. McCann, Minister of Health and Social Services, Mr. Fortin (Pontiac), Mr. Zanetti (Jean-Lesage), Mr. Gaudreault (Jonquière) and Mr. Ouellette (Chomedey), moved:

THAT the National Assembly require the next Canadian Government to commit to correcting the imbalance in investments in health by transferring all the amounts claimed by the Québec Government to Québec, and that it do so before the end of its next mandate.

#### Information on the Proceedings of the Assembly

Mrs. Gaudreault, Third Vice-President, informed the Assembly that on Wednesday, 2 October 2019, during Business Standing in the Name of Members in Opposition, a debate would be held on the motion moved by Mrs. Montpetit (Maurice-Richard).

This motion reads as follows:

THAT the National Assembly solemnly reiterate that achieving greenhouse gas (GHG) emission reduction targets is necessary to combat climate change;

THAT the National Assembly reaffirm Québec's commitment to reducing its GHG emissions from 1990 levels;

THAT it recall that Québec has set up a cap-and-trade system (CATS) for greenhouse gas emission allowances;

THAT it highlight the fact that Québec and California linked their cap-and-trade programs under the *Western Climate Initiative* in 2014;

THAT it recall the motion unanimously passed last September 25 declaring a climate emergency and asking the Québec Government to use all necessary means to "rapidly and drastically reduce our greenhouse gas emissions";

THAT, lastly, the National Assembly formally request the CAQ Government to not reduce the greenhouse gas emission reduction efforts required of companies under the cap-and-trade system.

# **ORDERS OF THE DAY**

#### **Government Bills**

#### Passage in Principle

The Assembly resumed the debate, which had been adjourned on 26 September 2019, on the motion moved by Mr. Julien, Minister of Energy and Natural Resources, that Bill 34, An Act to simplify the process for establishing electricity distribution rates, do now pass in principle.

At the end of his address, Mr. Ouellet, House Leader of the Third Opposition Group, moved the following motion to divide the said Bill:

THAT, pursuant to Standing Order 241, Bill 34, An Act to simplify the process for establishing electricity distribution rates, be divided into two bills, the first of which shall be entitled "An Act on the reimbursement of amounts overbilled by Hydro-Québec", and shall comprise sections 20, 21 and 22, except the words ", except sections 1 to 4, paragraphs 2 and 3 of section 6 and sections 8 to 10 and 18, which come into force on 1 April 2020"; and the second of which shall be entitled "An Act to amend the process for establishing electricity distribution rates", and shall comprise sections 1 to 19 and 22.

At 3.37 o'clock p.m., Mrs. Gaudreault, Third Vice-President, suspended the proceedings.

The proceedings resumed at 3.50 o'clock p.m.

At 3.58 o'clock p.m., after hearing arguments from all sides regarding the receivability of the motion to divide, Mrs. Gaudreault, Third Vice-President, took the matter under advisement and suspended the proceedings.

The proceedings resumed at 4.48 o'clock p.m.

Mrs. Gaudreault, Third Vice-President, ruled on the receivability of the motion to divide moved by Mr. Ouellet, House Leader of the Third Opposition Group.

### **RULING FROM THE CHAIR**

Parliamentary jurisprudence has recognized that, for a motion to divide to be declared receivable, a bill must contain more than one principle and each bill resulting from the division must be coherent, complete and able to stand alone.

The Chair has also mentioned on numerous occasions that analysis of a motion to divide's receivability should not be based on the bill's author's purpose but should consider the bill's provisions to determine whether the bill contains more than one principle.

In light of these criteria, and having read and analyzed the bill's provisions, the Chair has ascertained the existence of more than one principle in the bill. It is not because principles may be grouped under a single theme that they are to be considered simply terms within a single broader principle.

Once it has been determined that a bill contains more than one principle, the Chair must determine if the way the sections are divided among the different bills resulting from the division generates separate bills that are coherent and can be considered independently.

The motion to divide proposes that the bill be divided in two. The first bill would concern reimbursing amounts overbilled, while the second would concern the reform of the process for establishing electricity distribution rates.

The Chair notes that both bills resulting from the division are coherent, complete and able to stand alone.

While it is true that section 22 of the bill would be found, at least in part, in both of the bills resulting from the division, jurisprudence has established that this does not render the motion out of order since this coming into force section is compatible with both bills.

Given the aforementioned, the Chair concludes that the motion to divide meets the criteria established by jurisprudence.

Consequently, the motion to divide is declared receivable.

Mrs. Gaudreault, Third Vice-President, informed the Assembly of the allocation of speaking time for the proceedings with respect to the limited debate on this motion: 58 minutes 30 seconds to the parliamentary group forming the Government; 34 minutes 51 seconds to the parliamentary group forming the Official Opposition; 12 minutes 27 seconds to the Second Opposition Group; 11 minutes 12 seconds to the Third Opposition Group; and 1 minute 30 seconds to each independent Member. However, if only one independent Member takes part in the debate, that Member's speaking time is 2 minutes. Within this framework, any time not used by an independent Member or by a parliamentary group shall be redistributed among the parliamentary groups in the proportions established above. Lastly, individual addresses shall not be limited.

The Assembly entered upon the debate on the motion to divide moved by Mr. Ouellet, House Leader of the Third Opposition Group.

#### **Debates upon Adjournment**

At 6.02 o'clock p.m., the Assembly held three debates upon adjournment:

— the first, on a question from Mrs. Rizqy (Saint-Laurent) to Mr. Roberge, Minister of Education and Higher Education, about the CAQ Government's improvisation with regard to the development of prekindergarten for four-year-olds, to the detriment of CPEs;

- the second, on a question from Mrs. Montpetit (Maurice-Richard) to Mr. Lamontagne, Minister of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, on the refusal to do a longitudinal study on the effects of pesticides;
- the third, on a question from Mr. Leitão (Robert-Baldwin) to Mr. Girard, Minister of Finance, on the CAQ Government's reluctance to tax the GAFAM Internet giants.

At 6.38 o'clock p.m., Mr. Picard, First Vice-President, suspended the proceedings until 7.30 o'clock p.m.

The proceedings resumed at 7.30 o'clock p.m.

# **Government Bills**

Passage in Principle

The Assembly continued the debate on the motion to divide moved by Mr. Ouellet, House Leader of the Third Opposition Group, within the framework of the debate on the passage in principle of Bill 34, An Act to simplify the process for establishing electricity distribution rates, introduced by Mr. Julien, Minister of Energy and Natural Resources.

The debate being concluded, the question was put on this motion to divide, and a recorded division was thereupon demanded.

The motion was negatived on the following vote:

The Assembly continued the debate on the motion moved by Mr. Julien, Minister of Energy and Natural Resources, that Bill 34, An Act to simplify the process for establishing electricity distribution rates, do now pass in principle.
