Complaints of Breach of Privilege or Contempt and Personal Explanations

Following a motion carried by the National Assembly on 29 September 2010, the Chair recognized that Hydro-Québec had, at first glance, been in contempt of Parliament owing to the fact that it had failed to comply with the order adopted by the Assembly.

However, contempt proceedings had been suspended to grant an additional period allowing Hydro-Québec to submit the documents in question.

Several series of documents have since been produced by Hydro-Québec. Under these circumstances and after having discussed the matter with the parliamentary groups and the independent Members, the Chair deems that this question of privilege is closed.

Motions Without Notice

A period of 15 minutes shall be allotted for the closing statements, which time shall be shared equally among the members of the parliamentary group forming the Government and the Members sitting in opposition;

The Minister of Labour shall be a member of the said Committee during its proceedings with respect to this order of reference.

The motion was carried.

Notices of Proceedings in Committees

Information on the Proceedings of the Assembly

This motion reads as follows:

THAT the National Assembly demand that the Liberal government forgo the increase in tuition fees announced for fall 2012; that it freeze tuition fees until the holding of a higher education summit and the adoption of a framework law on tuition and other related costs whose purpose will be to reduce student debt, take into consideration students' ability to pay and preserve economic accessibility and regional accessibility.

Government Bills

Passage in Principle

Mr. Fournier, Minister of Justice, moved, —That Bill 24, An Act mainly to combat consumer debt overload and modernize consumer credit rules, do now pass in principle.

After debate thereon, the motion was carried and Bill 24 was accordingly passed in principle.

Mr. Fournier, Government House Leader, moved that Bill 24 be referred for clause-by-clause consideration to the Committee on Citizen Relations.
