#### Complaints of Breach of Privilege or Contempt and Personal Explanations

Mr. President gave a ruling on the point of privilege or contempt raised by the Member for Sainte-Marie–Saint-Jacques on 12 June 2014 concerning the Member for Jean-Lesage, who allegedly used threatening language while directing an intimidating gesture at her.

#### **RULING FROM THE CHAIR**

In her notice, the Member indicated that, at the sitting of 10 June, the Member for Jean-Lesage spoke to her on the floor of the Assembly Chamber regarding her recent comments on nickel dust in Limoilou. On this occasion, the Member for Jean-Lesage allegedly used threatening language while directing an intimidating gesture at her.

The President began by stating that, as provided for in jurisprudence, when a situation involves elements that he did not witness himself, he must take the word of the Member who was reportedly threatened.

He then recalled that the *Act respecting the National Assembly* establishes the individuality of the office of Member and specifically provides that Members enjoy complete independence in the exercise of their duties. To ensure this, the Assembly and its Members are vested with parliamentary privileges that allow them to perform their duties freely and without hindrance. In 1993, the Supreme Court ruled that these privileges have a constitutional status, which indicates the importance given to the independence of the Parliament and its Members.

To ensure the observance of parliamentary privileges, the Assembly has the power to take action against contempt, which parliamentary law defines as being any act or omission which obstructs or impedes the work of the Assembly or of its Members, or which calls into question its authority and dignity. In this regard, the *Act respecting the National Assembly* provides that no person may breach the privileges of the Assembly and mentions various acts that constitute breaches of the privileges of the Assembly. Among these are assaulting, interfering with, bullying or threatening Members of the Assembly in the carrying out of their parliamentary duties as well as attempting to influence the vote, opinion, judgment or action of a Member by means of deceit, threats or undue pressure.

It is fundamental for a parliamentary institution such as the Assembly to be a forum for debates and exchanges. Certainly, opposing viewpoints may be heard therein and debates are sometimes animated, but they must not be to the detriment of the most basic respect that parliamentarians must have for one another at all times.

This is the spirit in which the rules governing the Assembly debates are written. The Standing Orders of the Assembly state that no Member speaking shall use language that is violent, abusive, or insulting, nor shall he threaten another Member. Though the comments made by the Member for Jean-Lesage were not made within the framework of a parliamentary debate, the Chair cannot accept that threatening words or acts may have occurred in this Chamber.

The Chair establishes a link with the obligation provided in the *Code of Ethics*, which stipulates that the "conduct of Members must be characterized by benevolence, integrity, adaptability, wisdom, honesty, sincerity and justice". At a time when society is dealing with issues of intimidation and parliamentarians are regularly advocating a change in tone during debates, the Chair finds it regrettable to be required to give a ruling on such a matter. It must be made very clear that the Chair will never accept that a Member be threatened or bullied, especially when this takes place on the floor of the House. It is a matter of respect for the dignity of the Assembly. It is for this reason that the Chair declares the point of privilege raised by the Member for Sainte-Marie-Saint-Jacques admissible.

However, as the Member did not indicate any intention to move a motion impugning the conduct of the Member, there will be no follow-up to this matter.

Mr. President then tabled a letter, dated 12 June 2014, he had received from the Member for Jean-Lesage in which the latter explained his version of the facts and expressed his apologies to the Member for Sainte-Marie-Saint-Jacques.

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Mr. President gave a ruling on a complaint of breach of privilege or contempt raised on 12 June by the Official Opposition House Leader. In her notice, she put forward that the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Land Occupancy had allegedly been in contempt of Parliament by releasing the content of Bill 3, An Act to foster the financial health and sustainability of municipal defined benefit pension plans, before it was introduced in the Assembly. She argued that there were similarities between certain provisions contained in this bill and an article published in a newspaper on 11 June 2014.

#### **RULING FROM THE CHAIR**

The President looked at the arguments regarding the obligation, for the Chair, to delay the introduction of the bill when the bill is the subject of a point of privilege. He recalled that a ruling on the receivability of a point of privilege cannot have an impact on the possibility for a bill to be introduced in the Assembly. The introduction of a bill and the point of privilege are two distinct elements and one has no impact on the other. The Assembly alone must decide, in its sovereign capacity, on the advisability of introducing the bill, examining it and assessing its content.

That being said, if the Chair is able to give a ruling on the day the bill is introduced, this ruling is given before the introduction of the bill, which may require the suspension of Assembly proceedings. The day the matter was raised, the Chair was not able to give its ruling. This did not prevent the minister from exercising his fundamental right to introduce the bill and did not prevent the Assembly from deciding to introduce the bill. The Chair must encourage parliamentary debate, not prevent it.

As regards the disclosure of the bill before its introduction in the Assembly, during their arguments, the House leaders of the Official Opposition and the Government each in turn gave examples of certain similarities and differences between Bill 3 and the details described in the aforementioned newspaper article. It seems obvious that the journalist had access to information allowing him to write his article, which is questionable.

Certainly, parliamentary jurisprudence recognizes the Government's right to inform citizens as regards the major policies contained in a bill. That being said, the Members must be the first to be informed of the details of a bill and not journalists, with all due respect for the fundamental role played by the latter in our democracy.

The Chair insists on the importance for parliamentarians to have priority over any information that they may require in the performance of their duties as legislators. However, an important distinction must be made regarding the case of 2007 that was referred to. Indeed, in 2007, the point of privilege concerned a press release issued by a minister to provide detailed explanations regarding his bill.

In this case, unlike the one in 2007, no formal communication aiming to reveal the bill was made by the minister. But first and foremost, when reading the provisions of the bill, the Chair cannot conclude that the published article was based on the text as introduced in the Assembly. Certain specific elements of the bill are included in the article, which is not insignificant. On the other hand, it is impossible to affirm that the final version of the text of the bill was disclosed before its introduction. For this reason, in light of the facts and parliamentary law, the Chair cannot conclude that the minister was, at first glance, in contempt of parliament.

Although it is not a case in support of a point of privilege, the Chair recalls that, when a bill is involved, everyone must be aware of the essential role of the parliamentary institution and its Members. The Chair therefore issues a reminder to ministers and the persons involved directly or indirectly in the process leading to the introduction of a bill in the Assembly: Members are the only ones who enjoy the legitimacy of assessing whether the content of a bill is in the public interest.

In conclusion, even if the content of a bill is not entirely revealed, the Chair hopes that the elements contained in a bill will not slowly be made public before its introduction. This would do indirectly that which is not permitted to do directly. It is a matter of respect for the fundamental role played by Members in our parliamentary democracy.

Debate on the Budget Speech

The Assembly resumed the debate, suspended at the sitting of 11 June 2014, on the motion by Mr. Leitão, Minister of Finance, —That this Assembly approves in general the budgetary policy of the Government, and on the motions stating a grievance by Mr. Marceau (Rousseau), Mr. Dubé (Lévis), Mrs. David (Gouin), Mr. Turcotte (Saint-Jean), Mr. Drainville (Marie-Victorin), Mr. Therrien (Sanguinet), Mrs. Massé (Sainte-Marie-Saint-Jacques), Mrs. Poirier (Hochelaga-Maisonneuve) and Mr. Bergeron (Verchères), subject to the receivability of these motions.

The debate being concluded, Mr. Gendron, Third Vice-President, declared that the motions stating a grievance were receivable.

First, the question was put on the motion stating a grievance moved by Mr. Marceau (Rousseau). This motion reads as follows:

THAT the National Assembly severely blame the Liberal Government for having presented an outrageous financial framework in the last election campaign.

A recorded division was thereupon demanded. The motion was negatived on the following vote:

Yeas: 44 Nays: 62 Abstentions: 0

The question was then put on the motion stating a grievance moved by Mr. Dubé (Lévis). This motion reads as follows:
