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A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

I am proud to present the 2020-2021 Annual Report of the National Assembly of Québec. In addition to providing an overview of our strategic plan, this report gives an account of the work accomplished during the last year within our institution by taking stock of the many different activities that took place and were deployed in a variety of forms. The COVID-19 pandemic, which is still active at the time of writing, has had a strong impact on the past year and the content of this publication reflects this.

In 2020-2021, the pandemic forced us to rethink the organization of all of our activities, while at the same time considering new ways in which we, as the first institution of the State, can assume and continue our role of supporting parliamentarians in their duties. This role, which continues to motivate us so strongly, is fundamental and serves as the foundation of our democratic and law-based society. MNAs had to adjust the frequency in which they worked in the House and in Parliamentary Committees while respecting the health guidelines. Their constituency work has also changed. In 2019, we inaugurated a new reception pavilion, which was praised by many as innovative and relevant. Institutional, interparliamentary, educational and cultural activities were to take place there. The arrival of COVID-19 changed the agenda.

Nevertheless, several activities were able to take place virtually thanks to the skill and diligence of the administrative staff. Furthermore, the IT upgrade projects already underway were propelled into high gear due, in part, to teleworking. Both informational and physical infrastructure projects had to be reorganized. The parliamentary reform, which aims to make our parliament more accessible, open and responsive, has continued to mature and take shape. However, this unusual year will have shown us in a spectacular way that human resources are the backbone of our organization and that we can count on them to continue to move forward, to progress and to offer an institution in full possession of its means.

Since I took office as President in 2018, I have wanted to open up our institution to as many people as possible. To do so, our practices will continue to evolve, certainly in a traditional way, but also in an innovative and open way. With the support of a solid and competent team, of politicians concerned with the growth of their institution and of Quebecers proud of their democratic history, I know that this quest is possible, because it is shared by those who believe in a promising future for Québec.

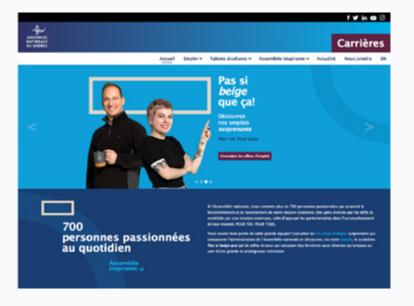

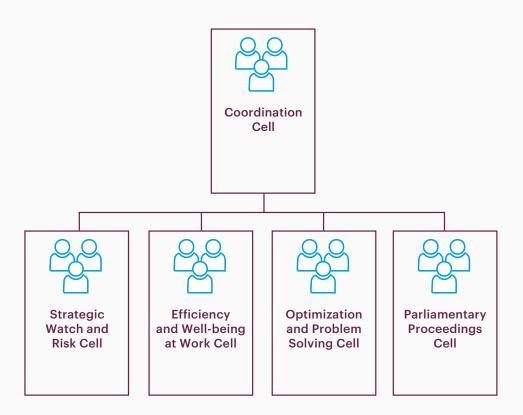

Office of the National Assembly

Established under the Act respecting the National Assembly (chapter A-23.1), the Office of the National Assembly exercises oversight, regulatory and approval functions.

The Office also performs other duties entrusted to it by the Assembly. It approves budget estimates, makes decisions relating to the administrative management of the National Assembly, and regulates expenditures and allowances allocated to Members and House Officers to perform their parliamentary functions.

For the duration of the 42nd legislature, the Office is made up of the President, six Members of the Government party, three Members of the Official Opposition, one Member of the Second Opposition party and one Member of the Third Opposition party.

Parliamentary proceedings

The business, discussions and debates in the National Assembly Chamber and on parliamentary committees are known collectively as "parliamentary proceedings." These proceedings follow the calendar set out in the Assembly's Standing Orders. There are two distinct periods during which the Assembly sits to conduct parliamentary business: spring and fall. Each sessional period comprises weeks of ordinary hours of meeting

followed by weeks of extended hours of meeting. Weeks are also set aside for riding work, and neither the Assembly nor committees may sit at this time.

Debates in the National Assembly of Québec follow specific rules of procedure derived from the British parliamentary tradition. Parliamentarians must also obey rules of conduct and observe decorum.

Ordinary and extraordinary sittings

In parliamentary language, each day of deliberations is a sitting. Ordinary sittings are those held in accordance with the parliamentary calendar and hours of meeting provided for in the Standing Orders; extraordinary sittings are held outside regular sitting periods, at the request of the Premier.

Each sitting of the National Assembly is divided into two periods: Routine Proceedings and Orders of the Day.

Routine Proceedings

The period known as Routine Proceedings serves mainly to provide parliamentarians with information, particularly from the government.

At this stage, bills are introduced, making them public, and the Oral Questions and Answers period is held.

Parliamentary committees

Parliamentary committees are work groups composed of a set number of MNAs who examine issues within the committee's particular area of competence and carry out other mandates assigned by the National Assembly. Committees are the ideal forum for the clause-by-clause consideration of bills, oversight of government activity and public consultations on topical societal issues in Québec.

The National Assembly has eleven standing parliamentary committees. Of these, the nine sectorial committees specialize in a particular area of government activity, while the two "horizontal" committees—the Committee on the National Assembly and the Committee on Public Administration—have a broader purview.

The Select Committee on the Sexual Exploitation of Minors was dissolved after having tabled its report in the National Assembly, on December 3, 2020. On a motion carried by the National Assembly on March 31, 2021, a select committee was created to examine the issues related to extending medical aid in dying to persons who are incapable of caring for themselves and those who are suffering from mental illness.

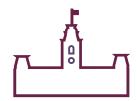

Political staff

Under the Act respecting the National Assembly (chapter A-23.1), the Office of the National Assembly establishes by regulation the standards and scales according to which the staff of an MNA or of a Minister's office are recruited, appointed and remunerated. The working conditions of other political staff, such as political attachés, advisors, support staff, researchers and executive assistants are also established by the Office, by regulation.

As at March 31, 2021, 472 people were employed by MNAs and House ministers on Parliament Hill and in riding offices. The number for March 31, 2020, was 468.

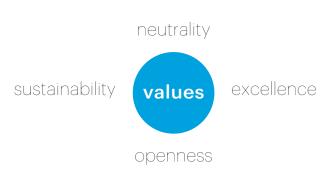

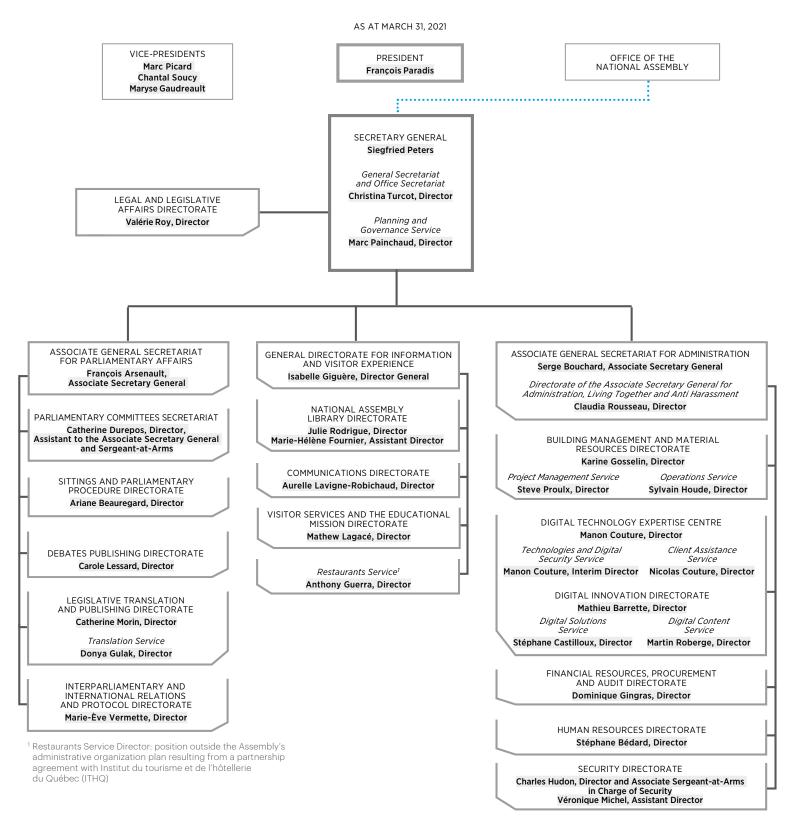

Educational Mission

The National Assembly's educational programs team contributes to developing a more responsible, better informed and more engaged citizenry with a stronger attachment to its democratic institutions. In collaboration with the Jean-Charles Bonenfant Foundation, the National Assembly organizes a number of outreach activities at the Assembly, virtually and remotely, and in schools, for youth, teachers of all grade levels and the general public.

The National Assembly also dispenses training sessions for those interested in the rules of parliamentary debate and the workings of Parliament, notably through a course on parliamentary law and procedure that has been offered at Université Laval for 17 years. The Assembly also offers a legislative drafting clinic, which allows students to undertake training in legislative drafting and provides the opportunity to draft bills as part of the Student Forum.

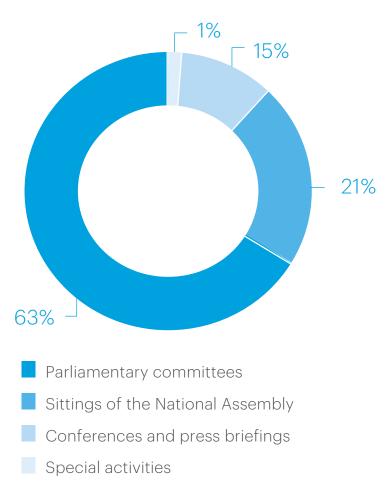

Legislative translation and publishing

All bills are translated so they can be introduced in the National Assembly in French and English. The same applies to amendments adopted during the legislative process, whether they are proposed in French or English. Statutes are published in the Annual Volume of the Statutes of Québec and on the Publications du Québec website.

In addition to its mandate to translate and publish laws, the Legislative Translation and Publishing team provides translation services to the administrative units of the National Assembly, the Lieutenant-Governor of Québec and the officers of the National Assembly.

Living together

Awareness campaign on respect

In 2020-2021, the National Assembly continued its preventive actions to develop and entrench a culture of respect and create a healthy and harmonious living environment for elected persons and political and administrative staff at the Parliament. Thus, from November 9 to 13, 2020, the *Ça me fait plaisir* campaign on respect and civility at work was held.

This campaign, which is part of the Action Plan on Respect at the National Assembly, was designed to be a simple and pleasant way of encouraging gestures of respect, courtesy, politeness, good manners and cooperation at work. It was intended for administrative staff, parliamentarians and their staff.

Managing situations of incivility, conflict and harassment

The National Assembly has also ensured that new employees are trained on how to manage incivility, conflict and harassment by inviting them to a mandatory training course that is already available to all employees and was offered **eight** times during the year 2020-2021.

Conference on diversity and inclusion

In an effort to provide an inclusive work environment for all, a conference on diversity and inclusion was offered on 3 occasions to all administrative and political staff of the National Assembly.

A total of 473 administrative staff members, 152 political staff members and 18 parliamentarians participated.

Action Plan for Persons with Disabilities

Since March 2021, the National Assembly has had an action plan for persons with disabilities. This plan was

developed in cooperation with a working group of persons with disabilities from various directorates.

Voluntary departure rate

The voluntary departure rate includes transfers, resignations and retirements. This rate decreased in

2020-2021 compared to 2019-2020. This is due to a lower number of transfers.

ISSUE 1: Quebecers' interest and trust in their democratic institutions

DIRECTION 1: AN OPEN PARLIAMENT

In order to maintain their interest and trust in the democratic institutions, people need to identify with them and understand how they work. With this in mind, the National Assembly must continue to open its doors and to use multiple channels of communication, both to reach the greatest possible number of people and to hear their concerns.

Aim 1. A "people's house" that is welcoming

The Parliament Building was closed to visitors for the entire 2020-2021 fiscal year due to the pandemic. No guided tours were offered during this period.

However, various projects were carried out and these will allow the National Assembly to consolidate its place as a must-see destination in Québec City. First of all, architectural lighting systems that highlight the ornamental richness and architectural details of the institution's buildings were put into operation. In addition, the renovation of the dining room of the Le Parlementaire restaurant was completed. Visitors will be greeted in a completely new decor when the restaurant reopens. Finally, a call for tenders was issued for the interior renovation of the National Assembly Library.

Priority 2: Partner with the community

With a view to offering a renewed visitor experience when health measures permit, Le Parlementaire restaurant has completed an extensive overhaul of its menus, in partnership with Institut de tourisme et d'hôtellerie du Québec (ITHQ). This new offer showcases Québec's emblematic products.

The National Assembly continued its partnership with the Festival de cinéma de la ville de Québec by presenting interviews with Québec cinema artisans in the agora of the reception pavilion. It also entered into partnership negotiations with the Carrefour international de théâtre and the Rendez-vous d'histoire de Québec to produce and film a theatrical activity and a series of conferences held at the Assembly.

A call for projects was also launched to develop the **Citizen Programming**, and to present a calendar of free activities intended for the general public. The Citizen Programming will begin in 2021-2022, in collaboration with various partners.

Aim 2. A "people's house" that communicates

Priority 3: Disseminate parliamentary and institutional information in a dynamic way

The Assembly website has seen a significant increase in the number of visits over the past year. The most popular sections were those on press conferences, petitions and bills.

New content was developed, including the **Careers** section, which aims to allow the National Assembly to stand out as an employer. The First Reading blog was also launched on the National Assembly Library website. It provides information on the Library's activities and news, promotes its collections and archival holdings, and disseminates original publications produced by the various departments of the institution.

During the year, the teams also worked on a project to implement a transcription assistance solution for the production of the Journal des débats. In short, the Journal will make it possible to optimize the creation of content and to caption a maximum number of videos available for broadcast and webcast.

Lastly, a reflection on the redesign of the National Assembly's website has been undertaken. The purpose of this project is to fill in the gaps, particularly in terms of user experience, referencing and accessibility, since the last major modernization of the website dates back to 2010.

Thanks to its dynamic publications and the diversification of its contents, the sustained increase in the number of persons subscribing to the National Assembly's social media (Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, Instagram and LinkedIn) continued in 2020-2021. Examples include the release of two informative videos on protocol, as well as the presentation of portraits of the directors expressing the management values advocated by the institution.

Priority 4: Increase disclosure of administrative information

The Office of the National Assembly approved, on the recommendation of a committee of parliamentarians, the regulation authorizing the disclosure of expenses of MNAs and office holders. A system and a new section of the website are being developed to produce and host this information. A training program for elected officials and members of their staff has been deployed to assist them in this new approach.

Work is also underway to disclose administrative information similar to that made public by Québec's departments and agencies on an annual basis, although the National Assembly is not subject to the government rules relating to this area.

An online disclosure of the 2020-2021 fiscal year expenses of the MNAs and the National Assembly's office holders as well as certain administrative information is scheduled for 2021-2022.

New forms were created to gather their comments and the content of the explanatory section of the National Assembly website was reviewed. Testing remains to be carried out before the official launch of this initiative.

Despite the fact that several educational activities scheduled to take place in person had to be cancelled due to the pandemic and health measures, the total number of participants increased significantly in 2020-2021 compared to 2018-2019. This increase is a result of the implementation of new virtual youth activities such as the "C'est quoi ton projet" legislative drafting contest and the "Faites vos commissions" parliamentary committee simulation, as well as the first-ever in-person Citizen's Day Camp in the summer of 2020. The offering of the "Comment ça marche" conferences for the general public was also expanded to target staff members of departments and agencies wishing to learn more about the workings of the National Assembly, which made it possible to reach several persons.

ISSUE 2: Adapting services to MNAs' evolving needs

DIRECTION 2: A PARLIAMENT THAT SUPPORTS THE PEOPLE'S REPRESENTATIVES

Supporting MNAs in their duties is at the heart of the National Assembly administration's mission. The administration must put all the conditions in place to allow MNAs to concentrate on the essential aspects of their work and fully play their role in a constantly changing environment. The administration's contribution includes the gamut of services provided to elected representatives and their staff as well as the tools made available, assistance offered and information communicated to them so they can perform their functions as effectively as possible.

In order to ensure that the administrative activities adequately meet the needs of MNAs, meetings of four advisory committees composed of parliamentarians continued during the fiscal year. These committees are as follows:

- · Advisory Committee on the Working Conditions and Various Allowances Paid to MNAs
- Advisory Committee on Zero Harassment at the National Assembly
- Advisory Committee on Sustainable Development
- Advisory Committee on Parliamentary Diplomacy

A feedback questionnaire to gather comments from parliamentarians following interparliamentary activities has also been developed. It will be deployed as soon as health conditions allow the resumption of such activities.

Priority 8: Ensure ongoing improvement of tools and services

The year 2020-2021 saw the advancement of various initiatives aimed at improving the tools and services offered by the National Assembly.

A project to review the processes for managing and implementing a new legislature was initiated in anticipation of the 43rd Legislature. Its purpose is to improve the reception, accompaniment, training and support of incoming and outgoing MNAs and their staff members, through the optimization of processes and the development of a technological solution aimed at modernizing and automating certain tasks. During the year, the structure of the mandate was established and a working group, made up of staff members from the different directorates involved, was formed to participate in defining the solution and to make recommendations to the authorities.

A great deal of work has gone into developing the content and layout of the various chapters of the 4th edition of the book *Parliamentary Procedure in Québec*. One chapter remains to be finalized.

The first draft of an information kit for parliamentarians appointed to positions of responsibility related to interparliamentary relations was created in order to better equip elected officials in performing their duties.

On the technological front, several projects have also progressed:

- New audio, video and robotic equipment was acquired and will be installed in the Blue Room to improve sound and image recording.
- The sound recording systems in two Committee rooms and a press room were replaced.
- Temporary solutions allowing the electronic signature of certain administrative documents and the tabling of electronic documents in the House have been implemented.
- The House Alert project, which allows MNAs and their staff to receive notifications on their technological devices related to the progress of parliamentary business, continued, and a first phase of testing began with a pilot group. However, this project must be deployed to the entire clientele.
- The infrastructure for the implementation of a unified communications system has been put in place and a global deployment strategy has been developed.

Aim 5. Support for knowledge development

Priority 9: Seek out best practices to fuel reflection on parliamentary work

Two benchmarking activities were conducted during the 2020-2021 year. The first focused on health-related adaptations in parliaments, while the second addressed the conduct of hybrid or virtual parliamentary business in parliaments around the world.

Priority 10: Put knowledge gained from exchanges with partner parliaments to work in the Assembly

Although all in-person interparliamentary activities were cancelled due to the pandemic and health measures, the National Assembly still participated in 60 such activities virtually in 2020-2021. A procedure for conducting virtual discussions was developed and implemented.

The quartet mechanism, comprising an interparliamentary and international relations advisor, a committee clerk, a research officer and a reference service advisor, which was introduced in 2019-2020 to link interparliamentary relations activities to parliamentary work, was consolidated. Documents clarifying the roles and responsibilities of each member of the quartet and outlining the service offering to parliamentary committees were developed.

As an employer, the National Assembly must look after its personnel's well-being, ensure they have a healthy work environment and provide them with appropriate support and tools to reach their full potential. The Assembly needs to be a more appealing employer in order to attract competent, diverse, motivated employees. The administration firmly intends to stand out from the competition owing to its inclusive practices and to take action to improve quality of life at work for all its personnel.

Aim 6. A culture of respect and inclusiveness

The National Assembly continued its activities to prevent situations of incivility, conflict, and harassment during the 2020-2021 year. An awareness campaign emphasizing civility was launched in the fall of 2020. Entitled "Ça me fait plaisir", it aimed to encourage gestures of respect, courtesy, politeness, good manners and collaboration in the workplace.

In addition, eight training sessions for administrative staff were held during the fiscal year. These sessions were delivered by the harassment responder and resulted in 149 persons being trained, for a cumulative rate of 88.9% of employees trained.

Sessions were also offered to parliamentarians who had not yet participated in the mandatory training. With these sessions, the training for all MNAs of the 42nd Legislature was completed.

Various actions have been implemented to raise staff awareness regarding diversity and inclusion issues.

A section of the National Assembly's Internet portal has been updated to include educational content on the subject.

An action plan on inclusion for persons with disabilities has been developed. Its objective is to establish a list of concrete actions to reduce barriers to the professional integration of persons with disabilities within the National Assembly and to facilitate their interactions with the institution.

Finally, consultations with administrative staff and preliminary work were also carried out to develop an action plan on inclusion and diversity. A conference on the topic was offered to all administrative and political staff during two sessions. A third session is planned for early in fiscal year 2021-2022.

Aim 7. Motivated, highly qualified personnel

The COVID-19 pandemic has posed professional and personal challenges for many persons. In order to better support staff members facing difficulties, the National Assembly has increased the amount allocated for the payment of professional fees under the Employee Assistance Program (EAP) from \$600 to \$850 per fiscal year. A page containing sites of interest, webinars and other resources, listed by topic, was also created on the institution's internal portal.

While a significant number of employees were teleworking, virtual breaks were put in place. Offering a respite to staff members, these virtual breaks made it possible to regularly gather employees around a short presentation offered by a colleague on various subjects.

Finally, during the year, the National Assembly entered into a partnership with HEC Montréal to participate in the Global Experience Panel project. This partnership will enable the institution to obtain precise data on the motivation and commitment of its employees through quarterly surveys sent to staff members.

The competency development indicator was further defined during the fiscal year. It is the rate of access of employees to skills development activities that has been retained. This indicator makes it possible to evaluate the effort made by the organization in terms of skills development for all employees, with a view to ensuring equity. Calculated for the first time, it was determined that 51% of regular and casual employees had access to at least one non-mandatory skills development activity in 2020-2021. The target to be achieved has been set at 65% in 2022-2023.

In addition, the service offering in terms of skills development and support for managers and team leaders in their management and coordination roles was reviewed. Managers and team leaders were able to participate in a training program given by ENAP. Additional training was offered to them, notably on remote leadership, in order to better equip them to face the challenges arising from the pandemic and teleworking.

In order to position the National Assembly as a workplace of choice, a major overhaul of the National Assembly's employer image was carried out during the fiscal year. An innovative communications campaign entitled **Pas si beige que ça!** was launched, along with the first episodes of a podcast featuring various employment sectors. The visuals and content of the job offers published by the National Assembly were modernized, as was the **Careers** section of the institution's website.

Despite the cancellation of several internships due to the pandemic, the National Assembly welcomed 46 students and interns in 2020-2021, which was 7 persons more than in 2018-2019.

Aim 8. A contemporary work environment

Two measures encouraging employee versatility and mobility, which began in 2019-2020, continued or were completed in 2020-2021:

- To increase administrative staff mobility and teleworking, approximately 300 laptops were distributed to the
 personnel based on the needs expressed by managers and the implementation of the computer equipment
 obsolescence plan.
- The deployment of the Office 365 suite and the new features of the Teams collaborative communication application was completed to facilitate remote work.

Two new measures were also completed during the fiscal year:

- A directive on the use of personal equipment for professional purposes was adopted to ensure the security of
 the National Assembly's information in a context of staff mobility and the use of third-party devices not owned
 by the employer. It is accompanied by a new mobile device management system (deployment of secure
 containers) aimed at strengthening the security of institutional data on mobile devices.
- A policy on teleworking has been developed to provide a framework for this mode of work delivery. It must be adopted by the authorities of the National Assembly.

A number of initiatives were put in place to address the work-family-life balance survey of MNAs and their staff in 2019-2020:

- Baby-change tables were installed on all floors of the Parliament Building in both the women's and men's washrooms.
- A breastfeeding lounge was set up near the Blue Room.
- A process to simplify access to the Parliament Buildings for spouses and children of MNAs was introduced.
- The Café du Parlement launched a new takeaway meal service.

Two projects related to modernizing work environments were completed in 2020-2021:

- An auxiliary kitchen was added to the Le Parlementaire restaurant facilities. It will allow for easier and more
 efficient food preparation and service.
- New showers were installed in the Pamphile-Le May Building and the Parliament Building.

A call for tenders was also completed in order to develop an overall vision for the layout of work spaces. The services of an architectural firm and an engineering firm were retained to support the in-house teams in the analysis of the needs, characteristics and issues related to the National Assembly buildings, with a view to developing an overall concept for the innovative design of the work spaces.

ISSUE 4: THE ABILITY TO RECONFIGURE AND INNOVATE

DIRECTION 4: A HIGH-PERFORMING PARLIAMENT

The National Assembly administration is well known for its efficiency in managing routine activities and delivering services to parliamentarians. While maintaining this efficiency, the administration wishes to improve its long-term planning, decision-making and accountability mechanisms by drawing on best management practices. It hopes to encourage the development of an organizational culture conducive to learning and innovation, with an emphasis on collaboration among the directorates, efficient information sharing and strategic monitoring.

The eight iterations planned to complete Phase 1 of the implementation of the budget monitoring management information software have been completed. However, two other iterations will finally be necessary to complete this first phase.

Preliminary work on the implementation of an institutional management dashboard has begun and an advisory opinion is being drafted. The objective of this project is to ultimately provide the authorities of the National Assembly with a tool for monitoring and periodically measuring the organizational performance of the institution, using various key indicators.

The Regulation on contracts was revised and a computerized tool for approving National Assembly contracts was deployed to facilitate the planning and monitoring of contracts.

The development of a governance framework and a project portfolio management framework for information resources was initiated. These framework documents aim to establish common rules for the organization, planning, execution, monitoring, reporting and closure of technology projects.

Finally, reflections on the IT master plan continued.

The Sustainable Development Action Plan measures that have been implemented are detailed in the following section of the annual report. A total of 11 of the 23 actions in the plan were completed as of March 31, 2021. Several delays were caused by the pandemic. Thus, 5 actions scheduled for 2020-2021 could not be completed. However, two actions that were scheduled to be completed in the next fiscal years have been fulfilled ahead of schedule.

The National Assembly's application to the Canada Green Building Council in January 2020 for LEED silver certification for the reception pavilion is still being evaluated. The pandemic has caused delays with the certification body.

Aim 10. A culture of communication and learning

The internal communications strategy, developed in 2019-2020, had to be adjusted to the context of the pandemic and remote work for a significant portion of the National Assembly staff. Several initiatives were carried out:

- A **COVID-19 newsletter** was created to allow staff members to stay informed and in touch with the National Assembly, even when working remotely.
- Information and thank-you videos were recorded by the Secretary General and the President.
- A COVID-19 section was created on the institution's internal portal.
- Reference guides were produced on topics such as psychological health, technologies and ergonomics.
- Posters were designed and installed in the National Assembly buildings to inform persons moving about the buildings of the health instructions to be followed.

A project to redesign the National Assembly's internal portal has begun with an inventory of its content and an analysis of its problem areas. The objectives of this initiative are notably to prevent the technology used from becoming obsolete and to allow the portal to meet the new Web standards.

Priority 21: Encourage strategic monitoring and partnerships to spur innovation

Four monitoring cells, made up of staff members from different directorates, were set up to support the management of the impact of COVID-19 on the activities of the National Assembly.

In addition to the usual monitoring, the National Assembly's Library Directorate conducted documentary monitoring focusing on various aspects of the pandemic in order to provide information to the cells. A total of 115 monitoring activities on various topics of interest were carried out during the year.

Two new partnerships were established in 2020-2021:

- A partnership was established with McGill University to develop a course in legislative translation from French to English as part of the graduate program in legal translation, and to prioritize applications from students in this program to complete an internship at the National Assembly.
- A partnership with HEC Montréal was established to participate in the **Global Experience Panel** research project. This partnership will allow the institution to obtain accurate data on the motivation and commitment of its employees through regular surveys sent to staff members.

A total of seven partnerships or collaborations have been established with the academic or professional community since the inception of the Strategic Plan.

| PARLIAMENTARY ADMINISTRATION

Several activities to strengthen security and continuity measures took place in 2020-2021.

The conceptual study for phase II of the infrastructure improvement project was completed. It has resulted in a coherent overall vision for the urban development of the National Assembly grounds. A master plan is currently being developed. The first stage of this project is to redevelop the inner courtyard and improve waste management, and the second stage is to improve safety on Rue des Parlementaires and the grounds of the institution.

With respect to information security, the organization has continued to implement new technologies to strengthen its threat prevention and response capabilities. In order to support the digital transformation and the securing of new solutions, a technology architecture team was set up. The capabilities of the cyber defense operations centre were also strengthened in order to increase the institution's maturity, particularly through better monitoring and detection of threats.

At the organizational level, new directives, stemming from the Information Security Policy, were adopted to better regulate the use of personal devices as well as recourse to cloud-based services by the National Assembly. Security reviews were regularly conducted on the institution's systems and applications in order to identify and correct security gaps that could pose a risk to the National Assembly's data. The Information Security Training and Awareness Program was updated through the deployment of phishing tests. In addition, approximately 250 persons from the political and administrative sectors participated in various information security awareness sessions (general security awareness, security in Teams, etc.)

Furthermore, the National Assembly adopted a risk management policy aimed at providing a framework for the identification, evaluation, control and monitoring of risks that could affect its ability to fulfill its mission.

In terms of continuity of essential services, the pandemic also made it possible to test several mechanisms, including the implementation of teleworking, the introduction of a bubble system within certain teams working on site, the obligation to wear personal protective equipment, etc.

Finally, with the goal of developing an emergency response plan to ensure the protection of the Library's collections in the event of a disaster, a calibration and analysis exercise was conducted and specialized response carts were acquired. The plan is currently being finalized.

2019-2023 Sustainable Development Plan results

The National Assembly's 2019–2023 Sustainable Development Plan sets out the Assembly's commitment to practices that respect the social, environmental and economic dimensions of sustainable development in its many spheres of activity. Two committees contribute to the implementation of the plan:

- An advisory committee made up of MNAs from each party;
- An advisory committee of administrative personnel.

As part of the Administration's 2019–2023 Strategic Plan (Priority 19), the Sustainable Development Plan sets out 23 actions to be carried out by the National Assembly between 2019 and 2023. This section presents the institution's achievements and results in relation to its sustainable development commitments for the year 2020-2021.

- The creation of a guide on the installation of an electric vehicle charging station at the constituency offices was accompanied by the launch of a pilot project involving ten MNAs from each parliamentary group represented at the National Assembly.

- The provision of ready-to-eat take-home and cooked-on-site products at the Café du Parlement to facilitate work-life balance.

- The installation of Charles-Étienne Brochu's work Sommet de la montagne on the forecourt of the National Assembly;
- The recording and virtual broadcasting of a Christmas story.

The National Assembly's GHG emissions inventory was completed for the 2020-2021 fiscal year. Through its institutional activities, as well as those of parliamentarians, the National Assembly produced a total of 1,675.22 tons of CO2 equivalent. This is a decrease of 508.97 tons of CO2 equivalent compared to fiscal year 2019-20201.

More specifically, 278.69 tons of CO2 equivalent were emitted by the travel of MNAs and of political and administrative staff (548.69 tons in 2019-2020), 1,389.47 tons of CO2 equivalent were generated by the energy consumption of the National Assembly buildings (1,624.21 tons in 2019-2020), and 7.06 tons of CO2 equivalent were generated by the residual materials produced during the period in question (11.28 tons in 2019-2020).

¹ Following the adoption of new GHG emission conversion factors by the Department of Energy and Natural Resources, the 2019-2020 fiscal year inventory was recalculated. A new emission category was also added to make the inventory even more accurate. This category covers emissions related to the use of chilled water inside the National Assembly buildings. The National Assembly's total GHG emissions for the year 2019-2020 were thus reduced from 2,364.53 to 2,184.19 tons of CO2 equivalent.

The decreases in GHG emissions between 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 are due notably to health measures that restricted the number of employees working on site and travel by parliamentarians and political and administrative staff, as well as to milder winter temperatures.

One of the objectives of the plan is to redevelop the inner courtyard of the Parliament Building and to overhaul the management of residual materials at the National Assembly in order to facilitate, among other things, the handling of the numerous bins and to eliminate the collection of bins on Rue des Parlementaires.

The first institutional emissions offset process for the National Assembly was completed in 2020-2021. It aimed to offset the emissions produced in 2019-2020.

A total of 964 tons of CO2 equivalent out of the 1,768.40 tons of CO2 equivalent resulting from institutional activities were offset with qualified organizations through a public tender. This represents 54.51% of the total institutional emissions for the 2019-2020 year.

An initial voluntary offsetting process for parliamentarians' GHG emissions was also put in place in 2020-2021. It allowed MNAs who wished to do so to offset a total of 329 tons of CO2 equivalent resulting from travel to and from their constituency and the Parliament Building, as well as from the activities of their constituency office, out of their constituency operating budget. As with the institutional approach, it is the emissions generated in 2019-2020 that have been offset.

² The minimum threshold for offsetting GHG emissions related to building energy consumption has been set at 30% to give the institution the flexibility to carry out reduction projects in this category of emissions. A diagnostic study to assess the level of obsolescence and energy performance of heating and cooling equipment is underway and will provide input for GHG reduction strategies.
