#### Exhibition 1792. A Parliament is Born

Located in the Visitor Centre, the exhibition tells the fascinating story of the origins of Québec democracy and follows the major debates in the House of Assembly of Lower Canada from 1792 to 1841. Come and discover this exhibition marking the 225th anniversary of Québec's parliamentary institutions. This monument to the glory of the women and men who have marked the history of Québec and French America is the seat of Québec's 125 elected repre-

sentatives. Since 1886, they have debated, passed legislation and made decisions here—all in the interest of improving their fellow citizens' quality of life. The Parliament Building truly symbolizes our democracy.

Recently, while preserving the Parliament Building's unique character, we began construction of an underground reception pavilion which will increase visitor capacity and make this key Québec institution even safer

This year, the National Assembly celebrates the 225th anniversary of Québec's parliamentary institutions. Lower Canada's first elections were held in 1792 and the first elected Members gathered at the House of Assembly in Québec City that same year. To highlight this milestone of Québec democracy, a series of activities will mark this commemorative year, including the exhibition "1792. A Parliament is Born" and the publication of an anthology of comic strips, a highly original nod to the first French-language cartoon featuring speech bubbles.


I invite you to take a tour of the Parliament Building to learn more about our history and traditions and get a taste of parliamentary life in Québec.
