(95) Mr. Bonnardel (Granby) – **20 October 2015** To the Minister of Labour

Pursuant to the *Act respecting collective agreement decrees*, public building maintenance businesses must observe the public building maintenance staff decree whose application is ensured by the Comité paritaire de l'entretien d'édifices publics.

As it turns out, a public building maintenance business must be incorporated in order to be able to bid on government contracts. Therefore, as it is often the case for small businesses, these businesses' shareholders work in operations. According to the Comité paritaire de l'entretien d'édifices publics, they thus become salaried employees and are therefore subject to the decree.

A maintenance business in my riding was fined by the Comité paritaire de l'entretien d'édifices publics because the owners of the business had not, pursuant to section 8 of the decree, received their vacation pay, which is 6 % of their earnings. As they are the only employees of the business, for economic and practical reasons, they chose not to take any vacations.

In addition to being obliged to remit vacation pays to both shareholders, the business was charged claims expenses representing 20 % of the amounts paid.

Is it really in the spirit of the law to apply these rules to owners who work in their own businesses? Is the Minister aware of this situation and does he approve of this?

(96) Mr. Lisée (Rosemont) – **20 October 2015**To the Minister of Employment and Social Solidarity

Phase 2 of the Stratégie nationale pour l'intégration et le maintien en emploi des personnes handicapées was to have been launched in June 2014, but we are still waiting for it. One of the measures provided for in Phase 1 of the strategy was the funding enhancement of the Contrat d'intégration au travail (CIT – action 44) measure, which facilitates hiring and maintaining of a disabled person in a regular work environment and promotes equal access to the labour market for disabled persons.

It should be recalled that the budget of the MESS' program 1, from which this strategy's funding comes, was cut by over \$17 M in 2014-2015 and by \$12.8 M in 2015-2016. In reply to a question asked on 16 September 2014, the Minister was unable to confirm that work integration contracts would be part of the measures included in Phase 2 of the strategy. He was also unable to specify the deadline that he set. We therefore asked him the same question on 26 February 2015. The Minister then told us that the deadline for Phase 2 of the strategy was being reviewed. Eighteen months later, we are still waiting for answers.

What is the Minister's deadline for the launching of Phase 2 of the strategy? Can he confirm that the CIT will be among the measures included in Phase 2 of the strategy and that they will be funded so as to allow more people to benefit from them?

(97) Mr. Lisée (Rosemont) – **20 October 2015**To the Minister for Rehabilitation, Youth Protection and Public Health

On 16 September 2014, we questioned the Minister about the Public Protector's report on the financial contribution toward placement (published in 2013). More particularly, we asked her to give us the deadline she had set to implement all of these recommendations. In reply to our questions on the progress of work, on 6 October 2014, the Minister recognized that the current regulatory provisions were inequitable with regard to financial contribution toward placement of minor children. She said she intended to review the *Regulation respecting the application of the Act respecting health services and social services* (chapter S-5, r.1), as well as establish a working group to prepare an action plan to follow up on the Public Protector's report.

Does the Minister still intend to review this regulation?

If so, what is the deadline?

When will the new regulation be in force?

How many meetings were held by the working group established by the Minister?

We would like a copy of the working group's action plan.

When we again questioned the Minister on 26 February 2015 regarding the state of progress of this work, the Minister indicated on the following 2 April, that:

The implementation of the Public Protector's recommendations might also require amendments to certain laws, particularly to allow access to tax information of parents whose contribution is required. As this is a law that is outside the purview of the MSSS, consultations with other departments may be necessary.

The Public Protector wants to again be informed of the progress of work on 16 October 2015. The MSSS will therefore make certain to forward an updated table of the follow-up work and to schedule another meeting.

Did consultations with other departments actually take place?

If so, with which departments?

What emerged from these consultations?

What is the Government's deadline as regards amendments to other laws?

We would like a copy of the follow-up table prepared at the request of the Public Protector and updated.

The Minister also indicated that:

All of the work defining the policy directions and enabling the follow-up to the Public Protector's recommendations will be completed during the summer of 2015. The Government will subsequently propose the necessary legislative and regulatory amendments.

Has this work been completed as scheduled?

When will the necessary legislative and regulatory amendments be introduced to the Members of the National Assembly?

The Regulation is 30 years old. When will the parents concerned finally see the new regulation?

(98) Mr. Lisée (Rosemont) – **20 October 2015**To the Minister for Rehabilitation, Youth Protection and Public Health

In December 2014, the Minister released a report entitled "Les activités socioprofessionnelles et communautaires: État de la situation et actions convenues pour l'amélioration des services." This report painted a picture of the various services provided to persons with intellectual disabilities, autism spectrum disorders (ASD) or physical disabilities at the end of their schooling, and raised issues of concern as regards their social and professional integration. The report presented the following 14 actions to improve the situation of these young people aged 21 years and over:

1. Establish an interdepartmental committee. This committee is composed of the MSSS, the MELS and the MESS, who will be joined, if necessary, by the MTQ and the MF. It will be coordinated by the MSSS. It's mandate is to support the development and consolidation of a common vision shared by the departments, to ensure the follow-up of work, to agree on how to address the other concerns raised, to discuss problems that could arise within the work context and to see to the evaluation of interventions with a view to developing expertise and adjusting practices if need be.

- 2. Support the development of a common vision by drafting a document that describes and explains the possible trajectories in accordance with people's life plans to introduce this understanding to the various networks.
- 3. Disseminate the document on the trajectories in each of the networks.
- 4. Create a support guide for all network stakeholders to promote a transitional approach from school to active life by adopting a common vision, by relying on leading principles fostering quality transitions, by ensuring the commitment of all stakeholders, by establishing the roles and responsibilities of each person and by supporting the development, as the case may be, of a common tool.
- 4.1 Disseminate the guide within the various networks.
- 4.2 Determine the conditions of the follow-up given to the implementation of the transitional approach from school to active life.
- 5. Take measures to ensure that young people with disabilities whose schooling ends in June 2015 do not end up without a support network, particularly those requiring daily supervision.
- 5.1 Agree to the information transmission conditions and communicate them to the education networks and to the health and social services network.
- 5.2 Regionally or locally refer students requiring daily supervision.
- 6. Specify the policy directions and clarify the roles and responsibilities as regards daytime activities.
- 6.1 Establish guidelines that will govern service offers concerning daytime activities within the health and social services network.
- 6.2 Develop a regional framework for the organization of daytime activity services.
- 6.3 Establish a plan to implement the new organization of services, while avoiding service breakdowns.
- 6.4 Establish follow-up and accountability mechanisms for the various management levels.
- 7. Examine the work-family balance needs of families who must deal with the presence of a disabled adult who does not have the necessary autonomy to stay home alone.

- 8. Within the context of the Intégration sociale à la formation générale des adultes study programme renewal, test and document a partnership commitment approach among the MELS, MESS and MSSS network organizations, to support the achievement of the adult's life plan and social participation.
- 9. Promote the public education services included in the adult educational services plan among the partner departments.
- 10. Within the framework of the new Politique nationale du sport, du loisir et de l'activité physique, improve support to organizations providing adapted services to disabled persons and support concerted actions that encourage these persons to adopt and maintain a physically active lifestyle.
- 11. Develop and implement an MESS-MSSS national reference framework guiding the achievement of local and regional services agreements between both networks' establishments and organizations. This framework will clarify the MESS and the MSSS service offer, specify the roles and responsibilities of the establishments and organizations involved in both networks as regards reception, evaluation, references from one network to another, follow-up, assistance and joint interventions for disabled persons.
- 12. Support the improvement of transport services, particularly in rural areas, by better coordination of services throughout the region and the establishment of interconnections between adjoining services.
- 13. Improve access to daytime activities within the health and social services network and ensure follow-up thereof.
- 14. Continue to improve the connection between the MSSS and MESS services and measures within the framework and following the work that will be carried out.

How advanced is the implementation of each of these recommendations? What is the Minister's deadline to complete the application of each of them? How many meetings of the interdepartmental committee have been held since its establishment?

How many amounts were granted in order to implement these recommendations?

We recently questioned the Government about students with special needs who are left without any services at school. A complementary services agreement exists between the Ministère de l'Éducation and the Ministère de la Santé but, in actual fact, it has hardly been applied owing to a lack of resources and because several stakeholders are unaware of its existence.

It is nonetheless necessary and urgent that we truly apply the complementary services agreement between both departments so as to adequately support our children with difficulties, so that they may receive, in a timely manner, the services that their situation requires.

For each of the regions, in how many cases was the MELS-MSSS agreement applied during the past five years?

How many intervention plans and personalized and cross-sectoral services plans were developed during the past year? During the past five years?

What is the rate of compliance and application with regard to these plans?

How many meetings were held for each of the MELS-MSSS regional tables, whose mandate is to coordinate each one's roles and responsibilities, during the past year?
