When questioned about this on 2 December 2015, she replied that Bill 59 indeed aims to provide a framework for hate speech and for speech inciting violence, that a good number of legislatures worldwide have done this, and that we are also responding to a specific request made by the Commission des droits de la personne et de la jeunesse for this type of speech to be regulated by Québec law.

Considering that hate speech is already prohibited under the Criminal Code of Canada, and in order to support her comments, would the Minister of Justice table the list of jurisdictions (and the relevant legislation) that provide a hate speech framework in both their criminal law and criminal offences, as she is about to do with Bill 59?

Last November, I asked the Minister for Maritime Affairs for data concerning passenger and vehicle traffic regarding the Québec-Lévis, Sorel-Tracy–Saint-Ignace-de-Loyola, Matane–Baie-Comeau–Godbout and Tadoussac–Baie-Sainte-Catherine ferries for the period from 1 June to 1 November 2015. The Minister showed transparency by providing the requested information.

Can the Minister clearly indicate, for each of these ferries:

- How many cars were transported between 1 November and 1 December 2015, between 1 December 2015 and 1 January 2016, between 1 January 2016 and 1 February 2016 in comparison with each of the same periods of the previous year?
- How many passengers were transported between 1 November and 1 December 2015, between 1 December 2015 and 1 January 2016, between 1 January 2016 and 1 February 2016 in comparison with each of the same periods of the previous year?

How has the government, since its maritime strategy was launched, facilitated the development of the maritime heritage? What tangible action was taken and what are the results?

To the Minister of Public Security

On 17 December 2014, the government announced the implementation of amendments to the "Lottery Schemes Regulation" and to the "Lottery Scheme Rules" adopted in pursuance of the "Act respecting lotteries, publicity contests and amusement machines".

Since the entry into force of the amendments in January 2015, several non-profit organizations in our riding have questioned us regarding the new regulation, which poses a problem.

Fifty-fifty lotteries allow certain organizations to be self-sustaining, or to give money to other organizations or foundations. Hence, several organizations wondered about the possibility of dividing fifty-fifty prizes. After having checked with the Régie des alcools, des courses et des jeux, the Régie informed us that according to its interpretation of the fourth paragraph of section one of the "Lottery Schemes Regulation", it was not possible to divide a winning prize among several participants.

This interpretation has a major impact on community and associative groups. Since the implementation of this new regulation, the participation rate in these lotteries has reduced considerably since participants have less chances of winning. Consequently, the reduction in participation has a direct impact on the sources of funding of non-profit organizations.

Will the government propose amendments to the "Lottery Schemes Regulation" so as to allow non-profit organizations to divide prizes and thus foster participation in this type of draw? Will the Minister of Public Security commit to helping non-profit organizations in their search for sources of funding?

(144) Mr. Roberge (Chambly) – **11 February 2016**
To the Minister of Education and Higher Education

In June 2015, the Minister of Education sent a letter to the directors general of school boards. This letter stated that schools cannot oblige parents to buy electronic tablets as school material for their child. Instead, schools must provide them to students free of charge. Following this letter, I believe that a follow up with the Minister regarding electronic tablets in public schools is in order. I therefore ask the Minister of Education to answer the following questions:

- In the present context of decreased budget allocations in education, does the Minister of Education believe that public schools that wish to provide students with electronic tablets must pay for this entirely out of their own budget?

- Does the Minister of Education acknowledge that public schools can maintain their autonomy and provide students with electronic tablets in as much as the governing board approves a financing package providing for funds that are partly from a sponsorship and partly from parents, striking an acceptable balance between parents whose income is higher and parents who are less well off?
- Does the Minister agree that public schools that would like to provide their students with electronic tablets are prevented from doing so, even if the governing board votes in favour of a financing package that reflects the realities of their community?

To the Minister of Families

In the annual management report of the Ministère de la Famille 2014-2015, on page 44, we read about the annual expenditure management plan 2014-2015 to foster access to quality early childhood education and care to children. The same page contains an indicator concerning the number and nature of mobilization activities carried out with child care service providers.

Can the Minister of Families explain to us why there is no target for this indicator? Does the Minister plan on establishing a target for 2015-2016?

Can the Minister of Families indicate the mobilization activities carried out in 2013-2014, 2014-2015 and 2015-2016?

Can the Minister of Families provide, for each of these mobilization activities, a description of the activity, the date, the place, the number of employees (full-time, part-time and contract) who took part therein and the cost of preparing and holding the event?

(146) Mrs. Lavallée (Repentigny) – **11 February 2016**
To the Minister of Families

In the annual management report of the Ministère de la Famille 2014-2015, on page 46, we read about the annual expenditure management plan 2014-2015 to foster access to quality early childhood education and care to children. The same page contains an indicator concerning the follow-up actions carried out to ensure that all violations found were corrected. The number indicates the proportion of child care services that, following an initial inspection within the framework of permit delivery or renewal, corrected 100% of the violations observed, within a period of six months.

Can the Minister of Families provide us with data that is updated as at 30 September 2015 since the data provided is dated 31 March 2015?

To the Minister of Families

In the annual management report of the Ministère de la Famille 2014-2015, on page 47, we read about the annual expenditure management plan 2014-2015 to foster access to quality early childhood education and care to children. The same page contains an indicator concerning the percentage of child care services operating illegally that complied with the Act after having been uncovered.

Can the Minister of Families provide us with this indicator's data updated as at 30 September 2015 since the data provided is dated 31 March 2015?

(148) Mr. Lisée (Rosemont) – **11 February 2016**
To the Minister responsible for Labour

- What is the total number of arbitration requests received, per month, since 2012?
- How many arbitration requests have come from RI-RTFs, per month, since 2012?
- How many cases went before an arbitration board and when?
- What is the average waiting time?
- Is the Minister satisfied with this waiting time?
- What does she intend to do to reduce this waiting time?

- Does the Minister plan to appoint new arbitrators so that hearings can be held within a shorter period of time? If so, what is her timeline?
- Does she foresee establishing timelines so that the hearings are obligatorily held within a reasonable number of days?

(149) Mrs. Lamarre (Taillon) – **16 February 2016**
To the Minister of Health and Social Services

In its report tabled in November 2015, the Auditor General (AG) demonstrated, after reviewing the agreements negotiated between the Liberal Government and the medical federations, that additional sums were paid to physicians upon closing the agreement on the averaging of wage increases. Page 21, chapter 2, of the report indicates that when the memorandums of agreement were ratified, the sums to be averaged over an eight-year period, which total \$5,675.6 million (table 6, line B), were overstated by \$148.5 million compared to the sums remaining to be paid in accordance with the compensation agreements, which total \$5,527.1 million.

In its comments, the Ministère de la Santé et des Services sociaux mentions that in paragraph 50, the Auditor General indicates that the sums to be averaged were overstated by \$148.5 million over the term of the agreement and that if there indeed was an error, the MSSS will correct it. (page 37 of the AG's report, chapter 2).

- How does the government plan to recover the overstated \$148.5 million paid to physicians following the signing of an agreement on the averaging of their wage increases?
- How will it correct its error?

(150) Mrs. Roy (Montarville) – **17 February 2016**
To the Minister of the Economy, Science and Innovation

Last 3 February, the Minister of the Economy, Science and Innovation stated that U.S. retailer Lowe's had given her the guarantee that jobs would be maintained as would RONA's headquarters in Boucherville. However, on 9 February she acknowledged that ultimately it will be up to the federal government to decide whether the guarantees provided by Lowe's to acquire RONA are sufficient to approve this transaction.

There remains some uncertainty with regard to the manner in which these guarantees were reportedly given to her by Lowe's. I would like to know exactly how these guarantees were given to her: Can she confirm if they were given verbally or in writing?

Would she also table all the documents provided by Lowe's further specifying these guarantees, particularly concerning the maintaining of jobs and headquarters in Boucherville?

Lastly, in light of the guarantees that were given to the Minister, can she tell me exactly how many jobs Lowe's plans to maintain at the headquarters in Boucherville, and over what period of time?

(151) Mrs. Soucy (Saint-Hyacinthe) – **24 February 2016**
To the Minister of Energy and Natural Resources

For the past several months, my political party and I have been trying to obtain information from Hydro-Québec. To that end, we have sent several access to information requests.

On numerous occasions, Hydro-Québec refused to provide the requested information, citing insurmountable obstacles to accomplish this, such as specific tracking operations in their computer systems and data extraction, analysis and validation work.

Last January, Hydro-Québec management informed us, by telephone then in writing, that we were simply sending too many requests and that it would not be able to answer our questions within the timelines set out in the *Act respecting Access to documents held by public bodies and the Protection of personal information*.

We collaborated with the Crown corporation in good faith and, on the one hand, for several weeks stopped sending requests for information, and, on the other hand, accepted that replies would be sent to us with some delay.

In spite of our efforts to collaborate and the additional time given to the Crown corporation, Hydro-Québec refused to provide us with all the responses to our requests.

Unfortunately, this situation is not unique and a great number of citizens and groups wishing to obtain information from Hydro-Québec have experienced this repeatedly.

Despite the greater transparency promised in June 2015 by the new chief executive officer of Hydro-Québec, Mr. Éric Martel, tangible results are not forthcoming.

I feel that this situation can no longer go on and that Hydro-Québec must comply with the spirit and intent of the Act by ceasing its lack of collaboration and by demonstrating the transparency that is expected of a public body.

I would like to know what actions the Minister of Energy has taken since June 2015 for Hydro-Québec to show greater transparency and, in light of the current situation, what actions does he intend to take to correct Hydro-Québec's current lack of transparency and collaboration?
