ROUTINE PROCEEDINGS

Introduction of Bills

Mr. President communicated to the Assembly and then laid upon the Table the report from the Law Clerk on the following Private Bill:

205 An Act respecting Municipalité de Cacouna

The report states that the notice was drafted and published in accordance with the Rules for the Conduct of Proceedings Respecting Private Bills.

Mr. Dumont (Rivière-du-Loup) then moved that leave be granted to introduce Private Bill 205, An Act respecting Municipalité de Cacouna.

Mr. Dupuis, Government House Leader, moved that Private Bill 205 be referred for consultations and clause-by-clause consideration to the Committee on Planning and the Public Domain and that the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Regions be a member during its deliberations in respect of the said Bill.

Passage in Principle

Passage in Principle

The debate continued on the motion by Mr. Béchard, Minister of Sustainable Development, Environment and Parks, —That Bill 23, An Act to ensure the enlargement of Parc national du Mont-Orford, the preservation of the biodiversity of adjacent lands and the maintenance of recreational tourism activities, do now pass in principle.

At 6.00 o'clock p.m., Mrs. Leblanc, Second Vice-President, suspended the proceedings until 8.00 o'clock p.m.

The proceedings resumed at 8.03 o'clock p.m.

Passage in Principle

The Assembly continued the debate on the motion by Mr. Béchard, Minister of Sustainable Development, Environment and Parks, —That Bill 23, An Act to ensure the enlargement of Parc national du Mont-Orford, the preservation of the biodiversity of adjacent lands and the maintenance of recreational tourism activities, do now pass in principle.

At the request of Mr. Gendron, Third Vice-President, Mrs. Lemieux, Official Opposition House Leader, withdrew certain words deemed unparliamentary.

At the end of her address, Mrs. Lemieux, Official Opposition House Leader, moved the following hoist motion:

THAT the motion under debate be amended by striking out the word "now" and by adding at the end thereof the words "this day five months hence".

Following a meeting with the House leaders, Mr. Gendron, Third Vice-President, informed the Assembly of the allocation of speaking time for the proceedings with respect to this limited debate on the hoist motion: 10 minutes shall be set aside for the independent Members; the two parliamentary groups shall share equally the rest of the time allotted for this debate; within this framework, any time not used by a parliamentary group will be added to that of the other group, while any time not used by the independent Members may be redistributed equally amongst the parliamentary groups, it having been agreed that this apportionment may not be carried out before the time allotted to both parliamentary groups has entirely expired; and individual addresses shall not be limited.

The Assembly entered upon the debate on the hoist motion moved by Mrs. Lemieux, Official Opposition House Leader.

At the request of Mr. Cusano, First Vice-President, Mr. Soucy (Portneuf) withdrew certain words deemed unparliamentary.

The debate being concluded, the question was put on this motion; a recorded division was thereupon demanded.

The motion was negatived on the following vote:
