To the Minister of Sustainable Development, the Environment and the Fight Against Climate Change

We were informed of a 30 % increase in the Ministère du Développement durable, de l'Environnement et de la Lutte contre les changements climatiques (MDDELCC) laboratory test fees for the Réseau de surveillance volontaire des lacs (RSVL) partners. This is the new tariff set for MDDELCC partners: shoreline residents' associations, watershed organizations, university researchers, etc. For water sample retesting, the RSVL's participation costs will increase from \$282 to \$372 per station for the 2016 season, an increase of almost \$100.

The internalisation of laboratory costs is a heavy blow to the partners, since the network is based on the volunteer work of the groups that take part therein. When the Ministère did not charge the full costs to the partners, the message being sent was that their contribution was appreciated.

Several shoreline associations and watershed organizations are worried about the fact that this increased pricing will jeopardize the sampling scheduled for 2016 and for subsequent years. This heavy blow is coupled with the cutbacks totalling approximately 10% carried out with regard to support to the watershed organizations' mission and the abolition of the blue-green algae awareness program. These actions slowly but surely weaken the environmental protection of our water resources, but also all other economic, social, cultural, tourism and recreation uses of our lakes.

Lastly, let us recall the entry into force, in October 2015, of the Government Sustainable Development Strategy 2015-2020, based on the principle of cost internalisation, which aims to discourage harmful activities and encourage environment-friendly activities. Thus, by increasing the MDDELCC's laboratory test fees, we are discouraging an activity that is desirable for the protection of our lakes.

- What are the reasons for the 30% increase in the MDDELCC's laboratory test fees in 2016?
- How has the partners' share of the costs developed over the past five years?
- Has the MDDELCC examined sources of financing other than increased pricing for the partners?

(181) Mr. Traversy (Terrebonne) – **10 May 2016**

To the Minister of Sustainable Development, the Environment and the Fight Against Climate Change

On 6 May 2015, during the passage of Bill 32, An Act to amend the Act respecting compensation measures for the carrying out of projects affecting wetlands or bodies of water in order to extend its application, the Minister of Sustainable Development, the Environment and the Fight Against Climate Change justified the two-year postponement (until 24 April 2017) of the adoption of a legal and regulatory framework concerning wetlands as follows:

"[Translation] Hopefully, we will be able to table a bill next fall that will truly modernize the Environment Quality Act's authorization procedure and will thereby have a beneficial effect on the protection of wetlands. [...] We have already started work to arrive at a bill on the protection of wetlands, but we believe that we must include all of the necessary elements to have a comprehensive system, a system that will take into consideration the concerns of the agricultural community, a system that will take into consideration the concerns of the forestry industry, a system that will take into consideration the concerns of the transportation community, Mr. President, and especially a system that will also take into consideration the concerns of the municipal sector.

[...] As part of that work, will extend over a period of several years, a broad environment reform will be undertaken. It is important to include the concerns of the municipal sector, which often has to grapple with wetland protection issues. It is important to work in collaboration with and integrate the approach undertaken by the Ministère des Affaires municipales with regard to our reflection and, ultimately, to our end product, which will be a wetland protection bill."

More than a year after the entry into force of Bill 32, the Minister of Sustainable Development, the Environment and the Fight Against Climate Change still hasn't tabled a bill in response to the Green Paper on the reform of the Environment Quality Act's authorization procedure, nor has he made any further commitment regarding a prospective new deadline.

- (183) Mr. Traversy (Terrebonne) 10 May 2016
 To the Minister of Sustainable Development, the Environment and the Fight Against Climate Change

Since 2001-2002, the annual management reports of your department have been standardized and chapter 3, "Use of Resources", contains data on the annual human, budgetary and financial resources.

However, it is impossible to clearly identify how your department's budget has evolved. Indeed, the additions and deletions of sectors under your department's responsibility make this accounting compilation task difficult, if not impossible. The transfer of wildlife and parks activities to the MFFP is the latest example of this. It is necessary to make a meaningful comparison.

This is particularly the case since the department added to its original environment protection mission those of sustainable development, the preservation of biodiversity and the fight against climate change.

In short, a detailed compilation of how the department's budget has evolved over the past 10 years is necessary. Your department's budget directorate is surely in a position to produce tables that help enlighten citizens and elected officials with regard to the long-term evolution of your department's human, budgetary and financial resources.

- Will the MDDELCC make public a detailed and comparable compilation of the human, budgetary and financial resources of the past 10 years?
- Will the MDDELCC make the necessary adjustments in its next annual management report?
- (184) Mrs. Poirier (Hochelaga-Maisonneuve) 31 May 2016 To the Minister of Public Security

The Val-d'Or region, like several others, faces particular issues related to vulnerable populations, as recently shown in several news reports. The Minister of Public Security intervened to indicate the corrective measures he intended to implement to support victims of intolerable abuse in our society. Within this context, everyone agrees that supporting the initiatives of community organizations that propose preventive actions seems not only advisable, but a priority. It is always better to address the causes at an early stage rather than deal with the consequences.

Can the Minister of Public Security tell us what prevents him from authorizing the handing over of Val-d'Or's former "Château Inn" hotel, seized under the *Act respecting the forfeiture, administration and appropriation of proceeds and instruments of unlawful activity*, to the region's community stakeholders to carry out a housing project for vulnerable persons, knowing that 20 housing units have already been authorized by the Société d'habitation du Québec and that the City of Val-d'Or has committed to financially supporting this project?

(185) Mrs. David (Gouin) – 2 June 2016

To the Minister of Employment and Social Solidarity

In the Government's last budget, it is stated that the Minister of Employment and Social Solidarity and the Minister of Finance will announce the creation of a committee of experts that will evaluate the mechanisms associated with the principles of guaranteed minimum income. Given that in the past this idea was championed by both Milton Friedman and Michel Chartrand, by both Paul Krugman and Friedrich Hayek, and by both the Basic Income Earth Network (BIEN) and the Organisation populaire des droits sociaux (OPDS), we believe it is important that this committee be representative of the various trends regarding the issue.

Can the Ministers of Employment and Social Solidarity and of Finance name the experts who will sit on the aforementioned committee? Can they tell us whether the opposition parties will be permitted to suggest names? Can they tell us whether this will be a joint committee?

(186) Mrs. D'Amours (Mirabel) – 3 June 2016To the Minister of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food

The Régie des marchés agricoles et alimentaires du Québec is an important part of Québec's agricultural sector. The Régie was heard by the Committee on Public Administration on 8 September 2015. During this public hearing, parliamentarians noted several shortcomings with this agency, such as a strategic plan that had expired six years earlier, objectives that had not been met and undue delays in processing requests. The Régie's delay in processing requests is a major issue for the agricultural sector. Important files were tabled before the Régie over one year ago. In its last annual report, the Régie reported that the average in-house delay to process requests was 307 days in 2014-2015. It took an additional 22 days to issue decisions in 2013-2014 and 62 days more in 2014-2015, which is almost three times more than a year earlier.

Owing to the strategic importance of the Régie for the development of agriculture, what actions has the Minister of Agriculture taken to reduce inhouse delays to process requests and issue decisions? How does the Minister intend to ensure that the Régie will maintain reasonable in-house delays to process requests? When does the Minister intend to table the Régie's new strategic plan?

(187) Mrs. D'Amours (Mirabel) – 3 June 2016To the Minister of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food

On 1 December 2015, the following access to information request was sent to the Commission de protection du territoire agricole (CPTAQ):

(...), the list and details of all documents concerning Vaudreuil-Soulanges' logistics hub:

Since January 2012:

- List and copy of correspondence between the Commission de protection du territoire agricole du Québec (CPTAQ) and the Minister of Agriculture
- List and copy of CPTAQ correspondence
- Plans of the areas concerned
- Details regarding the agricultural areas concerned
- Impact assessments
- Notices produced
- Documents provided to the Minister of Agriculture
- Reports and/or records and/or minutes of the consultations
- All other documents relating to the logistics hub

In reply to this request, the CPTAQ refused to send us the notice produced at the Minister's request. Moreover, no other documents were provided to me because they were, according to the CPTAQ, sketches, drafts, preliminary versions, preparatory memoranda, personal notes written on documents, and other similar documents.

At the interpellation held on 6 November 2015, the Minister mentioned that he had received an incomplete notice from the CPTAQ during the summer and had asked the CPTAQ to carry out the required work. He then stated that he was awaiting the Commission's final notice and that once the final notice was known, he would inform the public.

That was over five months ago and the notice still has not been tabled.

Does the Minister intend to soon table the notice produced by the CPTAQ concerning the Vaudreuil-Soulanges logistics hub? If this notice is still unavailable, when does the Minister expect to receive this notice and will he commit to immediately tabling it in the National Assembly? If this is the case, why is this notice still unavailable?

(188) Mrs. D'Amours (Mirabel) – **3 June 2016** To the Minister responsible for Labour

Québec produces more than 50 % of all strawberries produced in Canada. Ten thousand tons of strawberries are picked annually in Québec. These strawberry producers, and those of several other farm products, hired over 9000 temporary agricultural workers in 2014. These workers come from Mexico, Guatemala, the West Indies and Honduras.

Temporary agricultural workers are an important workforce for agricultural producers. In Québec, agricultural producers provide, among other things, free housing to these workers. The rules of the Seasonal Agricultural Worker Program (SAWP), which provide a framework for the recruitment of foreign workers, allow producers to withhold \$2.21 at source per day for public services.

Moreover, producers from almost everywhere in Canada withhold this at source. This is not the case in Québec, however, as the *Labour Standards Act* only allows housing expenses to be withheld; it does not allow withholding at source for public services.

According to the Association des producteurs de fraises et framboises du Québec, this withholding for public services would represent at least 1 million dollars more for Québec businesses. It is important to understand that in agricultural production, profit margins are low and competition is fierce. Québec businesses must distinguish themselves from those of other provinces, especially of Ontario, to sell their products. This shortfall gives them even less flexibility compared to these businesses.

Considering the importance of temporary agricultural workers for Québec's agricultural production, the extent of expenses relating to housing and the fact that the SAWP should in principle allow withholding at source for service charges, which is what the majority of Canadian provinces do, does the Minister intend to modify Québec's labour standards to allow agricultural businesses to withhold at source for services?

(189) Mr. Traversy (Terrebonne) – 7 June 2016

To the Minister of Sustainable Development, the Environment and the Fight Against Climate Change

Within the framework of the Programme de soutien à la mission des organismes nationaux (PSM-N), the Government pledged financial support to environmental community organizations. Such funding allows them to fulfill their environmental and sustainable development mission more efficiently. Thanks to this stable and recurrent funding, environmental community groups were able to put their efforts into protecting the environment and promoting sustainable development.

Since 2013, the Government has not renewed the three-year agreements on mission support for national organizations. Though certain agreements were renewed individually, they were renewed at different times throughout the year and with reduced amounts in 2015.

Also in 2013, an all-party committee on environmental group funding had been established to move group recognition guidelines forward and to give groups predictable funding. The committee was composed of the Minister's office, of a working group under the authority of one of the department's assistant deputy ministers, and of environmental group representatives. However, this committee has not met since April 2014, despite requests from environmental groups.

1. When does the Government expect to consult the environmental community groups within the framework of an all-party committee to launch a new program to support the mission of environmental groups?

Although there are some funding programs per project, they do not meet the aforementioned objectives as would a mission funding program. Contrary to watershed organizations and regional environmental councils, other independent community action organizations for the environment do not benefit from enhanced and recurrent support following a foreseeable schedule.

Environmental groups are the intermediaries between Government policies and citizen action. Their efforts are essential at the local, regional and national levels to implement the Québec Government's commitments regarding climate change.

2. When will a recurrent program to support the mission of environmental groups be updated and improved? What is the Government's proposed timeline?

Since 1 April 2016, independent community action organizations for the environment have been in the dark. The financial impacts are very real and today they threaten the survival of these organizations. While waiting for an environmental group mission support program to be restored, organizations need financing comparable to that of previous agreements.

3. Can we expect a payment to support the mission of environmental groups by the end of summer 2016?
