Passage in Principle

Resuming the debate, which had been adjourned on 9 April 2002, on the motion by Mr. Bégin, Minister of Justice, —That Bill 68, An Act to amend the Act respecting municipal courts, the Courts of Justice Act and other legislative provisions, do now pass in principle;

Notices of Proceedings in Committees

Mr. Simard, Deputy Government House Leader, convened the following Committees:

- the Committee on Institutions, to continue its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill 54, An Act to reform the Code of Civil Procedure;
- the Committee on Planning and the Public Domain, to continue its special consultations on Bill 77, An Act to amend various legislative provisions concerning regional county municipalities;
- the Committee on Education, to continue its special consultations on Bill
 66, An Act to amend the Act respecting school elections;
- the Committee on Public Finance, to continue its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill 65, Budget Act No. 1 giving effect to the Budget Speech delivered on 29 March 2001 and to certain budget statements;
- the Committee on Transportation and the Environment, to continue its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill 72, An Act to amend the Environment Quality Act and other legislative provisions with regard to land protection and rehabilitation.

Information on the Proceedings of the Assembly

Mr. Bissonnet, Third Vice-President, rendered the following decision regarding a point of order raised at the sitting of 1 May 2002 by Mr. Vallières (Richmond) and Mr. Paradis, Official Opposition House Leader, concerning the Government's answer to a question addressed to the Minister of Education and to the Minister of Health and Social Services, in relation to the cost of asbestos removal work carried out in public buildings.

Following the tabling of this answer, Mr. Vallières (Richmond) and Mr. Paradis, Official Opposition House Leader, claimed that the question should not have been withdrawn from the *Order Paper and Notices*, since it contained only the part addressed to the Minister of Education.

RULING FROM THE CHAIR

While the Chair does not have the authority to interfere with the content of an answer nor to decide which Minister answers a question, the question by the Member for Richmond that was placed on the *Order Paper and Notices* of 13 December 2001 is exceptional since it should have been divided into two separate questions, being that it was addressed to two Ministers. It is for this reason that, after having dicussed the matter with the House leaders, the question will again be placed on the *Order Paper and Notices*, but it will not include the elements addressed to the Minister of Education for which an answer has already been provided.

Mr. Bissonnet then informed the Assembly that the "Act to amend the Environment Quality Act and the Act respecting the Société québécoise de récupération et de recyclage" placed under Notices Appearing for the First Time on the *Order Paper and Notices* of Thursday, 2 May 2002, in the name of the Minister of the Environment will be withdrawn at the request of the latter.

Finally, he informed the Assembly that on Wednesday, 8 May 2002, during Business Standing in the Name of Members in Opposition, a debate will be held on the motion by Mr. Béchard (Kamouraska-Témiscouata). This motion reads as follows:

THAT the Governments of Canada and of Québec fully take their respective responsibilities with regard to the softwood lumber crisis affecting Québec's forest industry, its workers and the regions of Québec.

ORDERS OF THE DAY

Government Bills

Passage

Mr. Julien, Minister of Revenue, moved the passage of Bill 14, An Act to amend the Act respecting the Ministère du Revenu and other legislative provisions as regards the protection of confidential information.

After debate thereon, the motion was carried on division and, accordingly, Bill 14 was passed.

Passage in Principle

Mrs. Papineau, Minister for Industry and Trade, moved, —That Bill 87, An Act to amend the Act respecting Société Innovatech du sud du Québec and the Act respecting Société Innovatech Régions ressources, do now pass in principle.

And debate arising;

The debate was adjourned in the name of Mr. Gautrin (Verdun).

Debates Upon Adjournment

The Assembly held two debates upon adjournment:

- the first, on a question by Mr. Fournier (Châteauguay) to Mr. Legault, Minister of Health and Social Services, about the number of beds made available to emergency ward patients;
- the second, on a question by Mrs. Rochefort (Mercier) to Mr. Sylvain Simard, Minister of Education, about the resources available to homosexuals and lesbians in high schools. Mr. Boulerice, Minister for Relations with the Citizens and Immigration, replaced the Minister of Education in this debate.

At 6.25 o'clock p.m., Mr. Beaulne, Second Vice-President, adjourned the Assembly until Wednesday, 8 May 2002, at 10.00 o'clock a.m.
