#### **Introduction of Bills**

On behalf of Mr. Poëti, Minister for Integrity in Public Procurement and for Information Resources, Mr. Arcand, Minister responsible for Government Administration and Ongoing Program Review and Chair of the Conseil du trésor, moved that leave be granted to introduce the following bill:

An Act to enact the Act respecting the implementation of the Canadian Free Trade Agreement and to bring measures relating to contracting by public bodies into compliance with that agreement, the Trade and Cooperation Agreement between Ontario and Québec and the Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement between Canada and the European Union and its Member States

The motion was carried.

Accordingly, Bill 171 was introduced in the Assembly.

The President issued his directive on the question raised by Mr. Nadeau-Dubois (Gouin) on 8 February 2018 concerning his address during the debate held on 7 February 2018 under Business Standing in the Name of Members in Opposition. The Member had been interrupted on a point of order, which caused him to lose some of the speaking time allotted to him for the debate.

#### DIRECTIVE FROM THE CHAIR

The Chair recalls that parliamentary jurisprudence has established that the time devoted to a point of order raised during a Member's address is counted in the Member's speaking time. This practice applies to all debates and all Members, whether they belong to a parliamentary group or sit as an independent Member.

However, as guardian of the minority's rights, the Chair must ensure that Opposition Members can express themselves. All the more so for independent Members, whose speaking time, especially during limited debates, is restricted on the basis of overall speaking time allocation, which cannot be changed.

Consequently, the Chair must be particularly vigilant when a point of order is raised during an independent Member's address. Given the limited time at the Member's disposal, the time devoted to a point of order will clearly affect the Member's speaking time considerably. This is not to say that independent Members are immune to points of order. Like any other Member, independent Members are subject to points of order if they violate the Standing Orders during their address.

In the case at hand, the point of order raised concerns use of the expression [TRANSLATION] "electoral interests...or disinterests" of the Government. Expressions of this type, which refer to electoral motives, are likely to be repeated during debates. In interpreting Standing Order 35, parliamentary jurisprudence has established that the Chair must always take into account the atmosphere in the room and the tone used.

The Chair recalls that the National Assembly is the ideal venue for debating our society's key issues and, as a political forum in which opposing views are debated, is often witness to Members disagreeing with their colleagues. Under these circumstances, points of order sometimes become tools of parliamentary strategy to interrupt a speaker's flow or rebut his or her arguments.

The President considers this to have been the situation in the case at hand.

Regarding "words deemed unparliamentary", the Chair is best placed to decide whether or not the context requires intervention. Furthermore, if a Member flouts the boundaries of what is permitted, the President will intervene on his own initiative. In grey areas, the President exercises his judgment and observes the general atmosphere before determining whether it is necessary or useful to cut off a Member to intervene on a point of order. Of course, Members and parliamentary leaders can raise points of order and the President will assess the situation, if applicable.

Nevertheless, the Chair expects Members to avoid systematically intervening as soon as an expression bothers them, since this is not the criterion for raising a point of order. The Chair wishes to protect the Members' ability to debate as freely as possible, and raising a point of order too quickly can prevent indepth debate on an issue. In this context, it falls to the President to rapidly put an end to a debate on procedure that would, in effect, thwart Members' rights, particularly those of independent Members, who have only limited speaking time. In this regard, the Chair reiterates that one of its main roles is specifically to safeguard the minority's rights.

#### **Deferred Divisions**

The Assembly took the division, which had been deferred at the sitting of 21 February 2018, on the motion moved by Mrs. Vien, Minister responsible for Labour, for the passage in principle of Bill 152, An Act to amend various labour-related legislative provisions mainly to give effect to certain Charbonneau Commission recommendations.

The motion was carried on the following vote:

Accordingly, Bill 152 was passed in principle.

Mr. Bonnardel, Second Opposition Group House Leader, together with Mr. Ouellet (René-Lévesque), Mrs. Massé (Sainte-Marie-Saint-Jacques), Mr. Lelièvre (Gaspé), Mr. Surprenant (Groulx) and Mrs. Ouellet (Vachon), moved a motion on future transport projects funded by the Québec Government; this motion could not be debated for want of unanimous consent.

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By leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Order 185, Mrs. David, Minister responsible for the Status of Women, together with Mrs. Poirier (Hochelaga-Maisonneuve), Mrs. Fournier (Marie-Victorin), Mrs. Lavallée (Repentigny), Mr. Nadeau-Dubois (Gouin), Mr. Lelièvre (Gaspé), Mr. Surprenant (Groulx) and Mrs. Ouellet (Vachon), moved:

THAT the National Assembly mark International Women's Day, which will be celebrated on 8 March 2018;

THAT it encourage Quebecers to play an active role in finding appropriate solutions to achieve de facto gender equality;

THAT it support initiatives aimed at fostering a Québec society marked by fairness, solidarity and equality;

THAT, lastly, it reiterate the importance and necessity of celebrating International Women's Day still today.

By leave of the Assembly, a debate arose thereon.

The debate being concluded, the motion was carried.

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By leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Order 185, Mr. LeBel (Rimouski), together with Mr. Martel (Nicolet-Bécancour), Mrs. Massé (Sainte-Marie-Saint-Jacques), Mr. Lelièvre (Gaspé), Mr. Surprenant (Groulx) and Mrs. Ouellet (Vachon), moved:

THAT the National Assembly demand a complete upgrade of port infrastructures, at the expense of the Federal Government, before transferring federal ports to the Québec Government or to a municipality.

After debate thereon, the motion was carried, and Bill 164 was accordingly passed in principle.

Mr. Fournier, Government House Leader, moved that Bill 164 be referred to the Committee on Institutions for clause-by-clause consideration.
