Mr. Birnbaum (D'Arcy-McGee), together with Mr. Arseneau (Îles-de-la-Madeleine), Mr. Ouellette (Chomedey) and Ms. Fournier (Marie-Victorin), moved a motion on abolishing the Centre national d'excellence en santé mentale; this motion could not be debated for want of unanimous consent.

Ms. Massé, Leader of the Second Opposition Group, together with Ms. Fournier (Marie-Victorin), moved a motion on commemorating the events that occurred on 29 January 2017 at the Islamic Cultural Centre of Québec City; this motion could not be debated for want of unanimous consent.

Mr. Arseneau (Îles-de-la-Madeleine), together with Ms. Montpetit (Maurice-Richard), Mr. Nadeau-Dubois, House Leader of the Second Opposition Group, Mr. Ouellette (Chomedey) and Mr. LeBel (Rimouski), moved a motion on the criteria and measures associated with the regional alert system; this motion could not be debated for want of unanimous consent.

By leave of the Assembly to set aside Standing Order 185, Mr. Lafrenière, Minister Responsible for Indigenous Affairs, together with Ms. Anglade, Leader of the Official Opposition, Mr. Ouellet (René-Lévesque), Mr. Ouellette (Chomedey) and Ms. Fournier (Marie-Victorin), moved:

THAT the National Assembly underline the 19th anniversary of signing of the Paix des Braves agreement;

THAT it applaud this historic agreement, which marked a new era in relations between Québec and the Cree Nation;

THAT it recognize that the Paix des Braves agreement is mutually beneficial;

THAT it reaffirm that this agreement has helped bring about ever-increasing autonomy for the Cree Nation;

THAT it highlight that this agreement remains to this day a source of inspiration in the nation-to-nation relations between Québec and Indigenous peoples;

THAT, lastly, it underline that this historic agreement led to last year's signing of the La Grande Alliance agreement.

#### **Business Standing in the Name of Members in Opposition**

Ms. Rizqy (Saint-Laurent) moved:

THAT the National Assembly reiterate the urgent need for action in the field of education to ensure students' educational success and academic perseverance during and after the pandemic;

THAT it recall that as of last fall, education stakeholders were alarmed by the dramatic increase in the student failure rate;

THAT it express its deep concern about the lack of motivation of young students since the beginning of the pandemic;

THAT it recognize parents' and school teams' grave concerns about a number of major issues, such as air quality, essential learning, delays in implementing a tutoring program, the late cancellation of ministerial exams, not knowing the weighting of first report cards, the continued absence of rapid testing, the delay in imposing the wearing of procedure masks, and the long-term impact of COVID on students' academic success and the risk of students and teachers dropping out of school;

THAT the Assembly ask the Government to put in place measures to assist students and school teams immediately, such as:

- Strengthening the tutoring program, in particular by setting up a refundable tax credit;
- Allowing university students to submit their candidacy for the tutoring program, regardless of their program of study;
- Adding a financial or tax incentive to entice retired teachers to return to work;
- Negotiating with teachers in good faith to avoid penalizing students; and

• Undertaking to convene, during the spring break, an emergency summit with all the stakeholders involved in educational success and academic perseverance to establish a 3-year crisis recovery plan to maximize Ouébec students' chances for success.

Mr. Picard, First Vice-President, informed the Assembly of the allocation of speaking time for the proceedings with respect to this limited debate: 10 minutes to the mover of the motion for her reply; 52 minutes to the parliamentary group forming the Government; 31 minutes 39 seconds to the parliamentary group forming the Official Opposition; 11 minutes 18 seconds to the Second Opposition Group; 9 minutes 3 seconds to the Third Opposition Group; and 1 minute 30 seconds to each independent Member. However, if only one independent Member takes part in the debate, that Member's speaking time is 2 minutes. Within this framework, any time not used by an independent Member or by a parliamentary group shall be redistributed among the parliamentary groups in the proportions established above. Lastly, individual addresses shall not be limited.

A debate arose thereon.

At the end of her address, Ms. Hivon (Joliette) moved:

THAT the first subparagraph of the fifth paragraph of the motion moved by the Member for Saint-Laurent be amended

- (1) by replacing the words ", in particular" by "so that all students who need it can benefit, in particular by allocating the required budgets and";
- (2) by adding the words "for parents who have relied on private tutoring services" at the end.

The motion, as amended, would read as follows:

THAT the National Assembly reiterate the urgent need for action in the field of education to ensure students' educational success and academic perseverance during and after the pandemic;

THAT it recall that as of last fall, education stakeholders were alarmed by the dramatic increase in the student failure rate;

THAT it express its deep concern about the lack of motivation of young students since the beginning of the pandemic;

THAT it recognize parents' and school teams' grave concerns about a number of major issues, such as air quality, essential learning, delays in implementing a tutoring program, the late cancellation of ministerial exams, not knowing the weighting of first report cards, the continued absence of rapid testing, the delay in imposing the wearing of procedure masks, and the long-term impact of COVID on students' academic success and the risk of students and teachers dropping out of school;

THAT the Assembly ask the Government to put in place measures to assist students and school teams immediately, such as:

- Allowing university students to submit their candidacy for the tutoring program, regardless of their program of study;

- Undertaking to convene, during the spring break, an emergency summit with all the stakeholders involved in educational success and academic perseverance to establish a 3-year crisis recovery plan to maximize Québec students' chances for success.
