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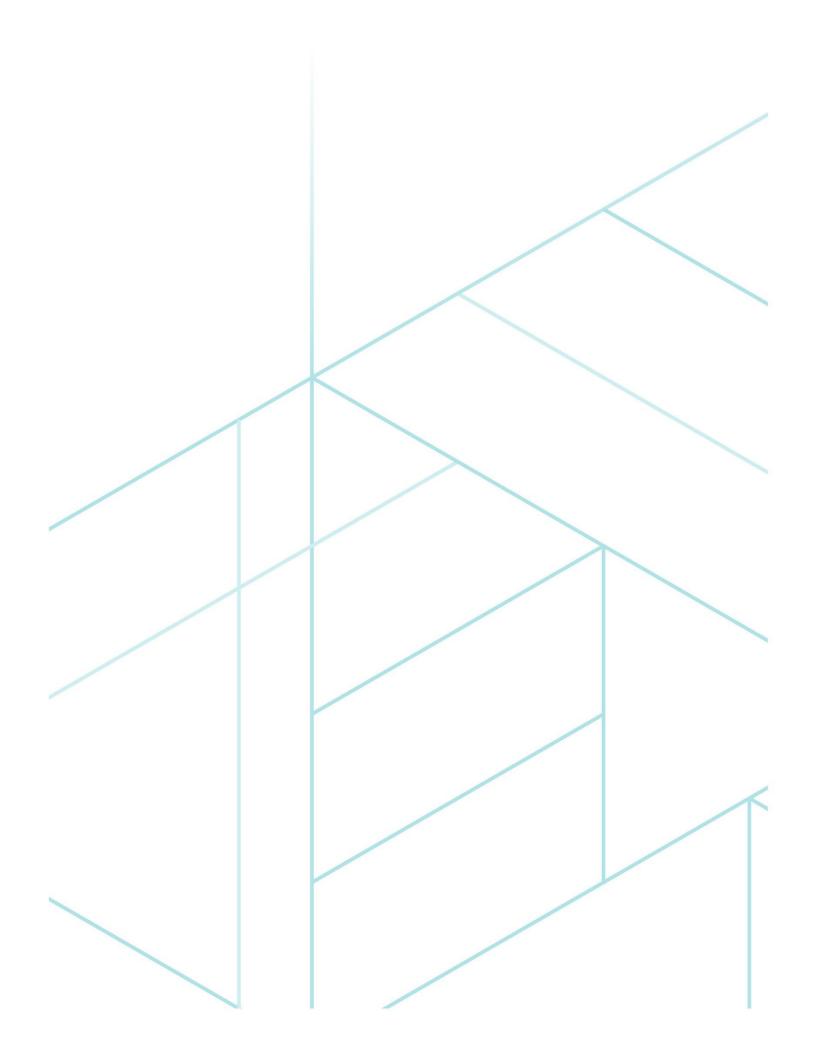

2024-2034 Québec Infrastructure Plan

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MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER RESPONSIBLE FOR INFRASTRUCTURE

The Québec Infrastructure Plan is a planning tool that allows the government to ensure that public funds are invested optimally, in line with government priorities and Quebecers' ability to pay. Both maintaining existing infrastructure and constructing new ones must meet the current and future needs of Quebecers. To achieve this, the plan targets sectors identified as priorities, particularly health and social services, education and higher education, the road network and public transit, as well as social housing.

This new plan for the next decade amounts to an unprecedented level of \$153 billion. This represents an increase of \$3.0 billion compared to the 2023-2033 QIP, and a \$52.6 billion increase, or 52%, over the last six years. Infrastructure maintenance investments reach a record level of \$87.6 billion, corresponding to 62% of QIP investments.

In the health and social services sector, our Government is pursuing its commitment to provide the population with access to modern facilities offering quality healthcare services. The Government is planning additional investments for the construction, reconstruction, expansion, and redevelopment of hospitals, the construction of seniors' homes and alternative housing (MDAA), as well as the reconstruction of long-term care hospital centers based on the MDAA concept, in order to provide a healthy and respectful environment for our seniors.

The education sector is also a priority, mainly for renovating schools and replacing equipment. It is essential that our children have the facilities they need for their educational development. We will also pursue projects to update programs tackling labour shortages in certain priority areas at college and university levels, as well as student housing construction projects.

For the road network sector, the new funding will mainly help maintain the quality of roadways, and structures, as well as municipal bridges across Québec. In addition, investments in public transit will promote public mobility, improve traffic flow, and continue the development of public transit electrification.

We will continue to make the right choices to ultimately deliver quality public infrastructure projects faster and more cost-effective. In this regard, since my arrival in 2022, I set up priority projects in collaboration with my colleagues and held meetings with our partners in order to deliver a two-year strategy in the near future that will have a lasting effect, aiming to reduce costs and delays in the completion of public infrastructure projects.

ACTUAL INVESTMENT

Actual financial contribution from the Gouvernement du Québec to a project for a government fiscal year that ended.

ADDITION

Expansion of an existing infrastructure, acquisition or construction of new infrastructure.

ADDRESSING THE ASSET MAINTENANCE DEFICIT

Investments (projects and portfolio maintenance envelopes) specifically identified to decrease the listed infrastructure asset maintenance deficit that is presented in the Annual Management Plan for Public Infrastructure Investments.

ASSET MAINTENANCE

Value of the work required to keep an infrastructure in satisfactory or better condition (government condition indicator of A, B or C) with the aim of protecting the health and safety of individuals, ensuring its continued use for its intended purposes, and reducing the likelihood of breakdown, or counteracting physical wear and tear.

ASSET MAINTENANCE DEFICIT

Value of the work required to restore the physical condition of infrastructure presenting a government condition indicator of D or E to satisfactory or better (government condition indicator of A, B or C) for the health and safety of individuals, and to ensure its continued use for its intended purposes and reduce the likelihood of breakdown or to counteract physical wear and tear.

CENTRAL ENVELOPE

Envelope which ensures the Government's financial contributions potentially required to implement the projects retained and prioritized by the Government from among those studied. Transfer of investments to the sector envelopes requires a Cabinet decision.

IMPROVEMENT

Increase in the service potential of existing infrastructure.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Building, equipment or civil engineering structure that is part of the government's service offering.

INFRASTRUCTURE MAINTENANCE

Investments for asset maintenance work, addressing the asset maintenance deficit, as well as replacement of equipment and reconstruction of buildings or civil engineering works.

INVENTORY ENHANCEMENT

Increase in the infrastructure portfolio by expansion of an existing infrastructure, or the acquisition or construction of new infrastructure.

MAINTENANCE

Work of limited scope normally performed as part of an infrastructure's use. Asset maintenance does not include maintenance work.

MAJOR PROJECT

Public infrastructure project subject to the Directive sur la gestion des projects majeurs d'infrastructure publique because its estimated cost is equal to or more than \$50.0 million, or \$100.0 million in the case of road infrastructure or public transit infrastructure projects. The Conseil du trésor can decide to consider any infrastructure project to be major if it deems appropriate.

PLANNED INVESTMENT

Financial contribution from the Gouvernement du Québec for a public infrastructure investment listed in the Québec Infrastructure Plan.

PROBABLE INVESTMENT

Probable financial contribution from the Gouvernement du Québec for the government fiscal year that is ending.

REDEVELOPMENT

In the real estate sector, this term generally refers to functional renovation work. Generally, it may be giving a new use to an infrastructure, a site, or making sure it works according to the new standards or proper protocols. This type of work often involves infrastructure as hospitals and schools.

REFURBISHMENT

Nature of work that refers to structural upgrading work to restore the infrastructure's ability to deliver the service for which it was originally built. In the end, the infrastructure will be upgraded from its current state, but its capacity will not be improved from its original design.

REPLACEMENT

Acquisition, construction or reconstruction of an infrastructure to replace an existing infrastructure that is usually at the end of its useful life, so as to ensure continuity in service delivery.

REPLACEMENT VALUE

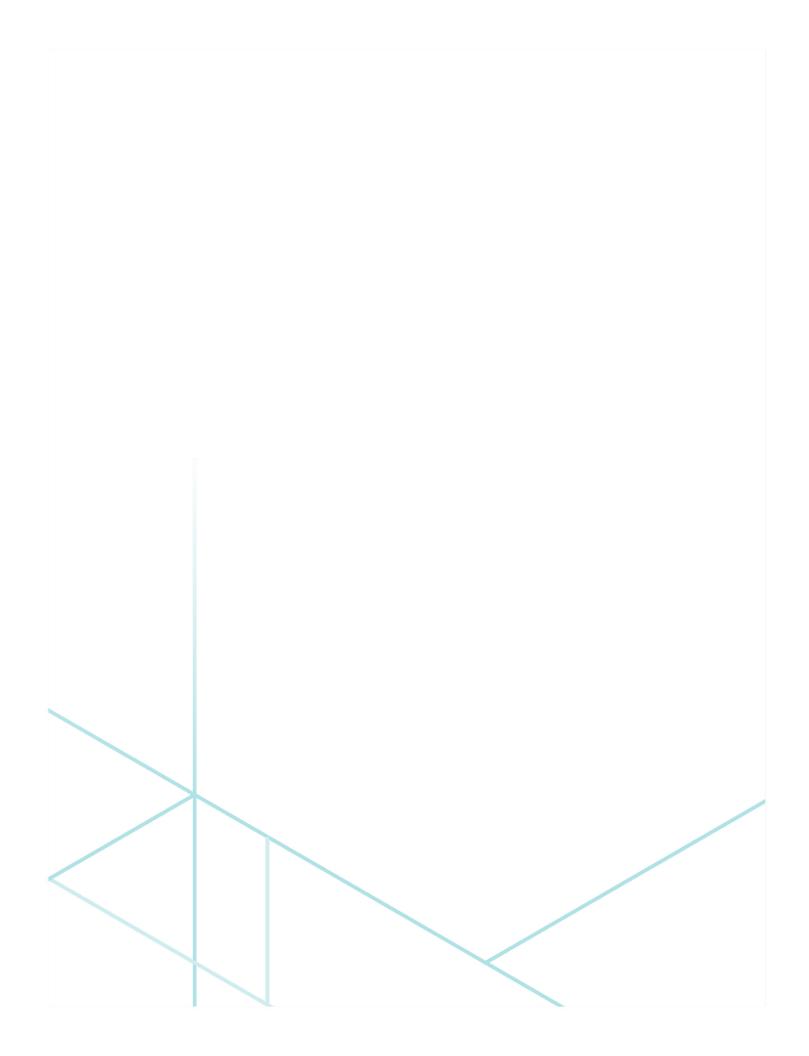
Investment required to build or acquire an infrastructure of the same dimensions and utility, with equivalent technical features, based on the construction techniques, building codes and materials or technical specifications in effect at the time of the estimate.

SECTOR ENVELOPE

Envelope, under the responsibility of a government department or body, to provide the required government financial contribution to implement prioritized projects and having obtained the necessary department and government authorizations.

USEFUL LIFE (duration)

Period over which an infrastructure or component should serve its intended purposes.

Introduction

Since the 2018-2028 QIP, infrastructure investments have increased significantly in order to provide the public with quality infrastructure that meets their needs. These investments, spread across all regions of Québec, also support and stimulate our economy. For the sixth consecutive year, the QIP has been expanded to \$153.0 billion, an increase of \$3.0 billion over the previous plan of \$150.0 billion and \$52.6 billion compared to the 2018-2028 QIP. The Government can thus enhance its investments in a number of activity sectors, notably:

- Health and social services, through the construction, reconstruction, expansion and redevelopment of hospitals, the construction of MDAAs, the reconstruction of CHSLDs based on the MDAA concept, or the conversion of EPNCs into EPCs;
- Education, where primary schools, secondary schools and vocational training facilities are undergoing major upgrading and expansion. New facilities are also available for students and teachers to meet their needs;
- Higher education, to address labour force needs, with projects to add pavilions, expand buildings and refurbish existing premises, and meet the accommodation needs of students, through the construction of housing units;
- The road network and marine, air, rail and other transportation, with the restoration and development of these networks;
- Public transit, through the electrification of garages and operations centres, as well as the acquisition
 of electric or hybrid buses and the development of various structuring networks;
- Information resources to continue the Government's digital transformation;
- Social and community housing, to carry out repair work and accelerate the construction of new homes that respect the financial capacity of households.

The first five-year period of the 2024-2034 QIP calls for a level of investment similar to that of the 2023-2033 QIP. A total of \$80.8 billion, or 53% of ten-year investments, will be made over the next five years.

- Section A includes the allocation of new investments, as well as the expected impact of planned investments under the 2024-2034 QIP on infrastructure sustainability.
- Section B presents planned investments under the 2024-2034 QIP by government activity sectors. It
 also includes accountability reporting on investments made in 2022-2023, probable investments for
 2023-2024 and information about past QIPs. A detailed list of the infrastructure projects by activity
 sector is now available on the Web¹.
- Section C presents a summary of the 2024–2025 AMPIs prepared by the departments and bodies targeted. These plans, which are published on the Web², allow to monitor the public infrastructure condition and AMD.

INVESTMENTS of \$153 billion from 2024 to 2034

A \$3.0 billion increase compared to the 2023-2033 QIP and an increase of \$52.6 billion

since the 2018-2028 QIP

to ensure the achievement of governmental priorities that meet the needs of the public and to continue to expand Québec's long-term economic potential Maintaining the infrastructure portfolio in good condition **remains a priority**, with **\$87.6 billion (62%)** of planned investments allocated to ensure the sustainability of public infrastructure.

Choices aligned with governmental priorities

Highlights

Choices aligned with governmental priorities, including:

- \$2.9 billion to continue the construction, reconstruction, expansion and redevelopment of hospitals, the construction of MDAAs, the reconstruction of CHSLDs based on the MDAA concept, and the conversion of EPNCs into EPCs;
- \$1.1 billion in education, mainly to carry out priority repair work on components related to the health and safety of individuals, as well as building integrity;
- \$481.0 million for higher education, to pursue the implementation of targeted measures related to graduation rate under Opération main-d'œuvre, as well as housing projects for college and university students;
- \$2.0 billion dedicated to maintaining the road network in good condition as well as its development, including reserved lanes for public transit on autoroutes;
- \$672.9 billion allocated to mobility improvements and public transit electrification;
- \$579.5 billion for infrastructure in other modes of transportation, including the acquisition of medical aircraft, as well as rehabilitation and upgrading of government marine and rail infrastructure;
- **495.4** million for information resources to promote the Government's digital transformation;
- \$97.0 million for repair work on community housing, in addition to the \$900.0 million announced in the fall 2023 Economic Update to support the construction of new community housing.

New major projects

- Launch of the Littoral Est du Saint-Laurent (phase IV) project in Québec City, a continuation of the Promenade Samuel-De Champlain, confirms the commitment of Capitale-Nationale to offer a high-quality environment.
- Planning of a new MDAA to replace the Centre d'accueil Saint-Joseph de Lévis, providing a larger space to accommodate 180 individuals in a better adapted living environment.
- A project under study of the outdated Hull detention facility to ensure healthier and safer working conditions for inmates and a better working environment for facility staff.
- Planning of the complete refurbishment of the exterior envelope of the courthouses in Québec City, built almost 45 years ago, to extend the useful life of the building.
- Other major projects in the higher education and health and social services sectors will be submitted to the Government for approval to undergo a project study during 2024-2025.

A strategic approach to infrastructure to be rolled out starting in the spring of 2024

Starting in the spring of 2024, the Government will be implementing a two-year strategy with lasting effects in order to reduce costs and lead times in the construction of public infrastructure.

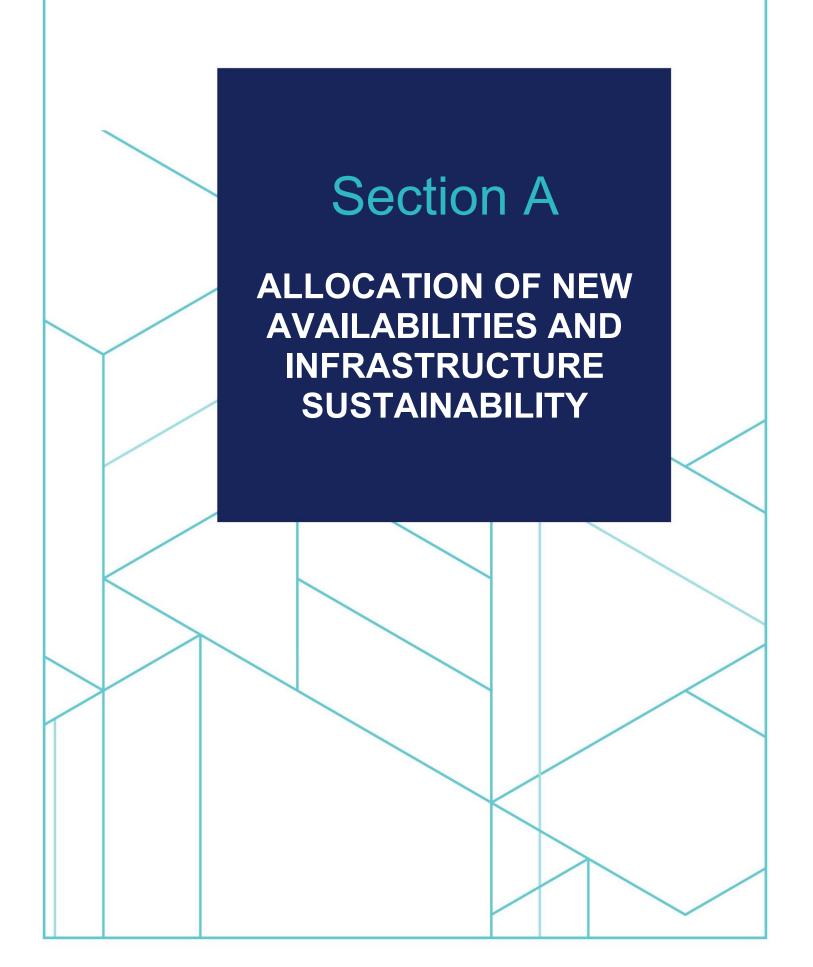
2024-2026 STRATEGIC APPROACH TO INFRASTRUCTURE

The Government will be announcing a number of concrete measures, for which the effects should be quick, in order to take action on four levels.

- An optimized planning Initiatives will be implemented to improve predictability between public investments and the ability of the construction sector. For example:
 - A periodic assessment of the ability of the construction market in various regions will be carried out in order to meet anticipated project demand. This exercise will enable to better take into account the ability of the construction industry when selecting projects under the QIP;
 - Targeted measures to improve industry capacity and productivity will be implemented, notably the continuation of building information modeling.
- A collaborative and competitive business environment At the same time, the Government will make project management more modern and efficient. For example, changes will be proposed to:
 - Promote the use of new performance-based collaborative modes;
 - Facilitate and accelerate the major project authorization process.
 - The Directive sur la gestion des projets majeurs d'infrastructure publique applies to the departments and bodies responsible for major projects and is designed to enable the Government to promote best practices in project management and to monitor the main parameters (cost, schedule, scope and funding) of the projects it funds. Its evolution will notably take into account the particularities of collaborative projects.
- More agile project providers Changes will be made so that they can be even more agile and efficient, within an equally transparent and rigorous framework.
- Improved monitoring of project performance An optimized dashboard based on standardized indicators will be deployed.

The Government's goal is to ensure that, by 2026, infrastructure costs and lead times would be reduced, resulting in improvement in the planning, realization and monitoring of infrastructure projects which will benefit to all Quebecers.

Overseen by the Minister Responsible for Infrastructure, this strategic approach is the culmination of work and consultations carried out, in collaboration with colleagues, since November 2022 and will deliver quick, sustainable and convincing results.



Section A

Allocation of new availabilities and infrastructure sustainability

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1. Investments targeted at priority activity sectors

1.1 Allocation of \$10.3 billion in new investments

Determined to deliver on its commitments without increasing pressure on the construction market, the Government is increasing the level of investments planned under the 2024-2034 QIP by \$3.0 billion to \$153.0 billion.

 This level of investment reflects the Government's commitment to achieving its priorities to meet the needs of the public, particularly in health and social services, education, the various transportation networks, public transit, and social and community housing.

Since the 2023-2033 QIP, \$10.3 billion in availabilities has been generated, due mainly to the advancement and completion of projects in 2023-2024, the addition of 2033-2034 and an increase of \$3.0 billion.

1.2 Choices based on governmental priorities

\$2.9 billion to continue building, expanding and redeveloping hospitals, CHSLDs and MDAAs

Additional investments of \$2,919.9 million have been granted to pursue projects already underway, to finalize the planning of those about to begin and initiate new healthcare projects. From this amount, \$1,720.8 million is allocated to the health and social services sector and \$1,199.2 million to the central envelope. These projects will make it possible to offer facilities that meet the standards and needs of a diversified clientele in hospitals, CHSLDs and MDAAs.

- \$1,800.8 million for major hospital construction, reconstruction, redevelopment and expansion projects, including the Amos hospital emergency and intensive care unit, and the Sept-Îles hospital emergency and operating suite.
- \$472.7 million for the reconstruction of CHSLDs based on the MDAA concept and the construction of MDAAs, including the CHSLD de Saint-Augustin, the MDAA de Labelle and the new major project to rebuild the Centre d'accueil Saint-Joseph de Lévis into a new MDAA.
- \$271.7 million to continue the conversion of EPNCs into EPCs.
- \$204.4 million for projects carried out under agreements with CBHSSJB and the NRBHSS.
- \$170.3 million for other projects and envelopes.

Over the coming year, the MSSS will be submitting, for Government approval, requests for new major projects set to undergo studies, at Hôpital de Saint-Eustache, Hôpital de Saint-Jérôme, and the addition of MDAA spaces.

Including the new \$1.7-billion allocation to the health and social services sector, total investments of \$23.8 billion are now planned for this sector under the 2024-2034 QIP. Of this amount, a contribution of \$10.2 billion is earmarked for infrastructure maintenance, or 42.9%.

SENIORS' HOMES AND ALTERNATIVE RESIDENCES DELIVERED AND OTHERS TO COME

Since the implementation in 2019 of the plan for major transformation of residential and long-term care environments for seniors and adults with special needs, namely, the new MDAA model, the QIP has been making investments to support it.

The QIP includes investments for 71 projects, including the construction of 49 new MDAAs, the reconstruction of 18 former CHSLDs based on this innovative concept, and the expansion and redevelopment of 4 existing CHSLDs, also based on this concept. These projects, which have been proceeding at a steady pace in recent years, will create 6,328 places for seniors and adults with special needs across Québec.

- In total, 3,579 places will be created by the 49 new MDAAs. The Government's transformation plan also includes the reconstruction of 18 former CHSLDs based on the MDAA concept. With a total of 2,623 places, 10 projects are currently under construction and the remaining 8 are in the planning stage.
- In addition, the plan calls for the expansion and redevelopment, based on the MDAA concept, of 4 existing CHSLDs, totalling 126 places, which will give a boost to the asset portfolio.

In addition, in 2024-2025, the MSSS will submit, for Government approval, a request to undergo a study for the addition of a large number of MDAA places.

\$1,1 billion for school renovations and additional spaces

Additional investments of \$1,117.0 million are being made to continue school renovations and the construction of new facilities needed for academic success, that is:

- \$987.0 million for infrastructure maintenance projects and equipment replacement, including \$950.0 million for priority work on components related to the health and safety of individuals, as well as to the integrity of the buildings;
- \$130.0 million for infrastructure enhancement, enabling three major projects to continue.

Including this new \$1.1-billion allocation, total investments of \$22.7 billion are now planned for the education sector under the 2024-2034 QIP. Of this amount, a significant contribution of \$15.8 billion is earmarked for infrastructure maintenance, that is 69.4%.

\$481.0 million for higher education

Additional investments of \$481.0 million in the higher education sector are planned under the 2024-2034 QIP, including \$191.6 million for the college network and \$289.4 million for the university network:

- \$200.2 million for projects and the update of programs related to Opération main-d'œuvre, aimed at tackling labour shortages in certain priority areas at college and university levels;
- \$197.8 million for housing projects for college and university students;
- \$83.0 million for non-major projects and one major project at college and university levels.

In addition, the MES will submit, for Government approval in 2024-2025, a request to undergo a study for a major project at the Polytechnique Montréal to increase its capacity.

Including this new \$0.5-billion allocation, total investments of \$8.5 billion are now planned for the higher education sector under the 2024-2034 QIP. Of this amount, a significant contribution of \$6.5 billion is earmarked for infrastructure maintenance, that is 76,2%.

\$2.0 billion to maintain the road network in good condition as well as its development

In the 2024-2034 QIP, investments of \$2,022.5 million have been allocated to the road network sector, mainly to ensure compliance with the intervention strategy for municipal roadways, structures and bridges, as to enable major renovation work to be carried out on these assets throughout the province. Other investments are also dedicated to non-major projects, as well as major projects.

Including this new \$2.0 billion allocation, total investments of \$34.5 billion are now planned for the road network sector under the 2024-2034 QIP. Of this amount, a significant contribution of \$28.3 billion is earmarked for infrastructure maintenance, that is 82.0%. In addition, investment in the road network sector includes \$1,446.7 million³ for projects relating to the development of reserved lanes and preferential measures for buses, which contribute to improving public transit.

- The road infrastructure under MTMD's responsibility includes more than 31,100 kilometres of road and some 9,900 structures, including several works of art, notably bridges, interchanges and supporting structures. The availability of these infrastructures is vital for the travels of the public, whether by private vehicle, public transit or freight transport.
- The investments necessary to keep these strategic assets in good condition, which are essential to Québec's economic development, are substantial. The end of the useful life of a significant portion of our road stock, built in the 1960s and 1970s, is imminent, and the high cost of reconstruction of roadways and engineering structures is a major contribution.

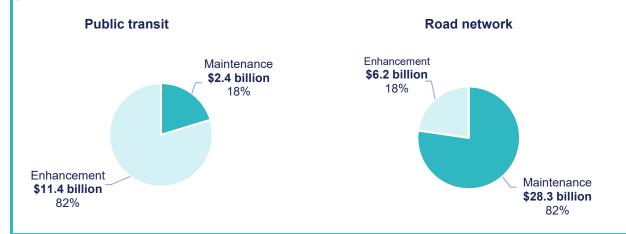
The Government must pursue to invest in road infrastructure to ensure user safety, improve the condition of its infrastructure portfolio and, with a view to sustainable mobility, enable its use through different modes of public transit.

³ These investments of \$1,446.7 million involve nine projects dedicated exclusively to the development of reserved lanes and preferential measures for buses, presented separately in the detailed list of infrastructure projects for the road network sector, available on the SCT website. Other road network projects that may include a reserved lane development portion are excluded from this amount.

DISTRIBUTION OF INVESTMENTS IN PUBLIC TRANSIT AND THE ROAD NETWORK BY INVESTMENT TYPE IN THE 2024-2034 QIP

The public transit sector is experiencing more development than the road network sector. As a result, the Government is planning more significant investments in infrastructure enhancement in the public transit sector than in the road network sector (\$11.4 billion versus \$6.2 billion).

Conversely, as the road network was built mainly in the 1960s and 1970s, it requires more significant investments in infrastructure maintenance than public transit. As a result, the Government is planning \$28.3 billion in infrastructure maintenance for the road network sector, compared to \$2.4 billion for the public transit sector.

To promote public mobility, increase traffic flow and electrify public transit, additional investments of \$672.9 million have been earmarked for the public transit sector for major and non-major public transit projects, including several new initiatives, in particular the construction of a garage to meet the needs of the Société de transport de Saguenay and the Société de transport de Montréal, and the acquisition of various equipment by the public transit corporations, exo and the ARTM.

Including this new \$0.7-billion allocation, total investments of \$13.8 billion are now planned for the public transit sector under the 2024-2034 QIP. Of this amount, a significant contribution of \$11.4 billion, representing 82.4%, is earmarked for infrastructure enhancement, as this is a developing sector.

Considering all the public transit projects under study and in planning that would require timely funding in future QIPs, as well as the REM project in Montréal undertaken by CDPQ Infra, investments in public transit could reach \$52.9 billion, broken down as follows:

- \$14.5 billion planned in the 2024-2034 QIP, including amounts earmarked for the central envelope;
- \$38.4 billion is estimated for:
 - Public transit corporations projects, currently listed as "under study" or "in planning", for which full
 provisioning will be planned for in future QIPs (specifically structuring projects for electric public
 transit);
 - The non-QIP project currently underway, under the responsibility of CDPQ Infra, namely the REM in the Montréal region.

The Government expects that its investments earmarked in public transit will reach \$52.9 billion, and its investments earmarked to the road network will reach \$69.0 billion. However, taking into account the following contributions, investments in the public transit sector could reach \$72.7 billion:

- \$12.2 billion from partners, including \$7.7 billion already confirmed or about to be⁴ and \$4.5 billion expected;
- \$7.6 billion from the Government for the development of reserved lanes and preferential measures for buses, planned for the road network sector in the 2024-2034 QIP.

\$579.5 billion for infrastructure of other transportation modes

A significant portion of the \$397.7 million in investments granted to the Marine, air, rail and other transportation sector will be devoted to the replacement of the medical planes of the Service aérien gouvernemental, as well as to the local road network financial assistance program designed to help municipalities improve and maintain the local and municipal road network infrastructures for which they are responsible. An amount of \$181.8 million has also been earmarked in the central envelope for the provisioning of a major project scheduled to move forward into the planning phase in 2024-2025.

Including the new \$0.4-billion allocation to the Marine, air, rail and other transportation sector, total investments of \$4.7 billion are now planned for this sector under the 2024-2034 QIP.

\$495.4 million for information resources

Information resources projects enable us, among other things, to offer citizens and businesses simplified, integrated, quality services based on information technology. Additional investments of \$495.4 million are planned under the QIP to support public bodies carry out their digital transformation projects, and to replace their IT equipment.

Including this new \$0.5-billion allocation, total investments of \$7.8 billion are now planned for the information resources sector under the 2024-2034 QIP.

\$248.1 million for the development of the northern territory and Indigenous nations

The QIP has earmarked a total of \$248.1 million in new investments for the development of the northern territory and Indigenous nations in order to address economic, social and environmental development issues.

These investments are divided between the refurbishment of the La Grande Rivière airport, various Indigenous police infrastructure projects and projects to upgrade the Billy-Diamond highway, mainly to improve safety.

Including this new \$0.2-billion allocation, total investments of \$1.4 billion are now planned for the development of the northern territory and Indigenous nations sector under the 2024-2034 QIP.

\$167.7 million foreducational childcare services

Educational childcare services link two of the governmental priorities shaping Québec's future: the economy and education. The Grand chantier pour les familles, launched in the fall of 2021, aims among other things to create enough quality spaces to meet families' needs, and to put equal opportunity back at the heart of government action.

An additional \$167.7 million has been earmarked for investments over the 2024-2034 period, maintaining the amounts earmarked in the QIP at over \$900.0 million. The purpose of these investments is to continue implementing projects that create new childcare centres spaces and permanent relocation of childcare centre spaces that are required to leave their current rented premises, mainly as a result of a takeover of these premises by the rental bodies.

Investments of \$124.1 million will support various projects in tourism and recreational activities, in particular the Société de développement et de mise en valeur du Parc olympique, the Société des établissements de plein air du Québec, the Société du Centre des congrès de Québec, the Société du Palais des congrès de Montréal, and the Commission de la capitale nationale du Québec, including the new major development project under study, the Littoral Est du Saint-Laurent program (phase IV), between the Baie de Beauport and Parc de la Chute-Montmorency in Québec City.

Including this new \$0.1-billion allocation, total investments of \$1.8 billion are now planned for the tourism and recreational activities sector under the 2024-2034 QIP.

\$97.0 million for social and community housing

Investments of \$97.0 million will support the renovation of community housing through the low-rent housing units renovation program. This amount is in addition to the additional investments of \$900.0 million announced by the Gouvernement du Québec in the Fall 2023 Economic Update to build new community housing.

Including this new \$0.1-billion allocation, total investments of \$3.8 billion are now planned for the social and community housing sector under the 2024-2034 QIP.

AN ADDITIONAL \$900.0 MILLION FOR COMMUNITY HOUSING FALL 2023 ECONOMIC UPDATE

In response to the growing demand for housing, the Government announced an additional investment of \$900.0 million in its Fall 2023 Economic Update. This investment, combined with an equivalent contribution from the federal government, for a total of \$1.8 billion, will enable the construction of 8,000 new housing units. These are in addition to the 15,000 additional housing units already planned thanks to investments by the Gouvernement du Québec, for an estimated total of over 23,000 new housing units.

 Moreover, the Gouvernement du Québec would like the Canada-Québec agreement under the Housing Accelerator Fund to serve as a model for any new federal funding program for infrastructure, since this agreement allows Québec to receive its fair share of federal funding, while respecting its jurisdiction and autonomy.

These rental units will meet the needs of low- and moderate-income households and individuals with special housing needs. They will also support the construction of quality buildings that integrate environmental measures and optimize residential construction practices.

Since the 2018-2028 QIP, the level of investments reserved for the social and community housing sector has been raised by \$1.5 billion, an increase of 63%. Through the AccèsLogis Québec Program, the Québec Affordable Housing Program and the Rapid Housing Initiative, the Government is investing and accelerating work to provide accessible, affordable housing for the Québec population.

\$1.4 billion allocated to other activity sectors

Investments of \$1,385.1 million were allocated to other activity sectors. Of this amount:

- \$648.1 million is earmarked for the sector envelopes:
 - \$247.6 million for government administration infrastructure, mainly in connection with two new major projects, namely the renovation of the exterior envelope of the Québec City courthouse and the maintenance and upgrading of the Hull detention facility. This amount also includes \$4.5 million to facilitate the harmonization of mobility services in the Québec City metropolitan economic zone (Capitale-Mobilité);
 - \$153.6 million to the research sector, mainly to enhance research infrastructures in healthcare and higher education;
 - \$246.9 million for five other activity sectors;
- \$737.0 million is earmarked in the central envelope for major projects and to implement the objectives of the Québec City metropolitan economic zone's action plan to stimulate economic development, innovation and collaboration within the greater area (\$5.0 million).

Section 1.3 provides details of availability allocation to activity sectors.

INVESTMENTS FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT AND THE ENVIRONMENT

To reduce GHG emissions and adapt to climate change, the Government intends to use \$61.2 billion in infrastructure investments focused on sustainable development and the environment. These are provided for in the 2024-2034 QIP as well as subsequent ones or those carried out by CDPQ-Infra outside the QIP.

Federal contributions of \$6.9 billion allocated to Québec as part of Phase 2 of the federal government's *Investing in Canada* infrastructure plan, will financially support the investments made by the Government.

Taking into consideration all of these investments, \$68.1 billion will be dedicated to electrification, reducing GHG emissions and adapting to climate change in the coming years.

1.4 A central envelope to carry out major projects

In accordance with section 7 of the PIA, the 2024-2034 QIP provides a central envelope to ensure the Government's contribution to major projects prioritized mainly for opportunity case or business case approval by March 31, 2025. The eventual transfer of amounts from the central envelope of \$11.1 billion to the sectors concerned requires a Cabinet decision.

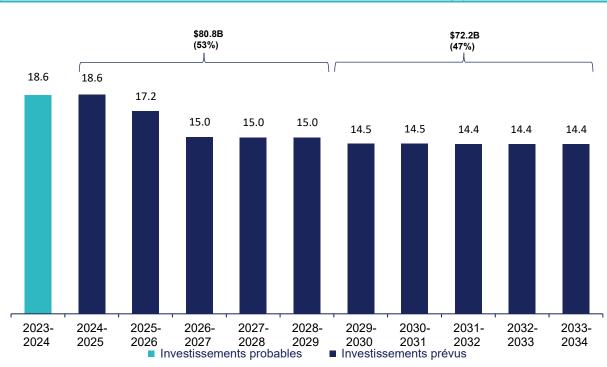
The Government must also plan for the gradual implementation of the major projects under study and in the planning stages of future QIPs. The annual update of future QIPs will make new funds available, which will guarantee projects retained will be completed.

• For projects under study or in the planning stage that require a contribution from the Gouvernement du Québec of \$1.0 billion or more and that will be completed in the shorter term, the central envelope is progressively provisioned based on the expected date of approval of their business case in order to plan investments.

Projects that are funded from the central envelope are not made public, in order to respect the Cabinet decision regarding their implementation and to reduce the risk of collusion in their execution.

1.5 An investment level in the first five-year period maintained

Compared to the 2023-2033 QIP, the Government is maintaining infrastructure investments planned for the first five-year period of the QIP at a similar level, to ensure the continuation of projects initiated throughout Québec under previous QIPs, particularly those covered by the LCACPI. Investments of \$80.8 billion are planned over the first five-year period, representing 53% of planned investments over ten years.

AN ACT RESPECTING THE ACCELERATION OF CERTAIN INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

This Act, which was enacted in December 2020, is to simplify certain procedures, without lowering existing standards, in order to launch priority infrastructure projects more quickly. These well-defined, limited and temporary acceleration measures target expropriation, government land, the environment, as well as land development planning and urbanism.

As reflected in the accountability reporting for November 30, 2023, 177 infrastructure projects are tracked under the LCACPI, following the withdrawal of five projects at the MEQ, MES, MSSS and MTMD and the subdivision of two projects at MEQ and MTMD, namely:

- 50 projects under the responsibility of the MTMD or the public transit corporations (structuring electric public transit projects, reserved lanes, reconstruction of roads, highways or bridges and rail tracks);
- 80 projects under the responsibility of the MSSS (MDAA, CHSLDs and hospitals);
- 35 projects under the responsibility of the MEQ (primary and secondary schools and adult education and vocational training centres);
- 4 projects under the responsibility of the MES (CEGEPs and universities);
- 8 projects under the responsibility of the SQI (courthouses and government buildings).

The LCACPI requires that semi-annual accountability reports be produced for each project benefiting from acceleration measures by May 31 and November 30 each year, along with close monitoring of their progress status. These accountability reports, published on the SCT website (Public Infrastructure section), must be completed until the infrastructure projects have been completed.

 Since the LCACPI was enacted in December 2020, 67 projects at MSSS, MEQ, MTMD and SQI have used acceleration measures provided for in the Act.

The Minister of the Environment, the Fight against Climate Change, Wildlife and Parks also publish an accountability report on the enforcement of acceleration measures relating to the environment, last updated on November 30, 2023.

A report on the enforcement of the LCACPI will be tabled in the National Assembly in 2026.

2. Planning investments focused on the sustainability of the infrastructure portfolio

2.1 Priority investments dedicated to infrastructure maintenance

The sustainability of the infrastructure portfolio has been a key governmental priority for several years now. Note that it is essential to maintain the public infrastructure needed to deliver government services in good condition.

As part of the 2024-2034 QIP, infrastructure maintenance investments remain a priority, accounting for \$87.6 billion or 62% of amounts earmarked for infrastructure over the next ten years. These exceptional investments are part of a strategy to gradually increase infrastructure maintenance investments, taking into account the findings set out in the AMPIs, which monitor the condition of the infrastructure portfolio and identify the infrastructure maintenance investments that need to be made.

The investments planned under the QIP are made by two types of bodies:

- Public bodies, such as departments, school service centres, and health and social services network
 establishments that own the infrastructure dedicated to public services directly under the Government's
 responsibility;
- Subsidized bodies, such as municipalities and public transit corporations, that receive a government financial contribution for the infrastructure they own and through which they deliver public services under their responsibility⁵.

In the 2024-2034 QIP, 80% of planned investments are for public bodies (\$122.8 billion) while the remaining 20% is aimed to subsidized bodies (\$30.2 billion).

⁵ It should be noted that only the government financial contribution to the bodies is included in the QIP.

Public bodies

Priority is given to public body projects aimed at improving the condition of the infrastructure portfolio, particularly the refurbishment and reconstruction of infrastructure at the end of its useful life.

- \$75.4 billion, or 67% of total investments of \$112.6 billion, are allocated to maintaining the infrastructure portfolio, including the refurbishment and replacement of infrastructure such as schools, hospitals, CHSLDs and road infrastructure. These investments also make it possible to renew outdated equipment.
- \$37.2 billion, or 33% of total investments of \$112.6 billion, are allocated on priority development needs of the portfolio, particularly for the construction of hospitals, as well as for the construction of MDAAs and new schools.

Subsidized bodies

The Government is also planning investments for subsidized bodies related to the development and maintenance of their infrastructure, providing better services to the public.

- \$17.0 billion, or 58% of the total \$29.2-billion investment, is planned for infrastructure portfolio enhancements, primarily for public transit corporations, educational childcare services and social and community housing. Significant amounts are also earmarked for public transit to promote public mobility, increase traffic flow and electrify this mode of transportation.
- \$12.3 billion, or 42% of the total \$29.2-billion investment, is earmarked to meet the infrastructure maintenance needs of subsidized bodies.

Since the infrastructure of these bodies is not Government-owned, they are responsible for maintaining it in good condition. Thus, the cost of work required to restore infrastructure in poor condition to good condition is not included in the AMD calculation.

2.2 Investments to address 64% of asset maintenance deficit over 10 years

The AMD associated with infrastructure in poor and very poor condition (GCI of D or E) for public bodies was assessed at \$37.1 billion in March 2024.

This deficit is explained by the fact that a significant portion of Québec's public infrastructure, most of which was built between 1960 and 1970, has reached or will reach the end of its useful life, which generally varies between 25 and 75 years, depending on the infrastructure. This is especially true of road infrastructure and buildings in the education network, since their advanced age means major investments are required to restore them to good condition (GCI of A, B or C).

Change in public body AMD

Over the last year, AMD for public bodies rose by \$2.2 billion. This variation is due to:

- An increase of \$2.7 billion due to the natural deterioration of public body infrastructure, including an upward revision of the cost of work to be carried out due to inflation arising from construction market conditions;
- A net increase of \$2.0 billion resulting from new needs in asset maintenance work identified during the period and a downard revision in the scope of work required to correct deficiencies identified on roadways in poor and very poor condition (GCI of D or E);
- A \$2.5-billion decrease for work completed in 2023-2024 in all activity sectors, thus reducing the AMD.

When comparing the AMD to the replacement value, an improvement is noted in the 2024-2034 QIP:

• The AMD of \$34.9 billion represented 10.8% of the replacement value of public body infrastructure in the 2023-2024 AMPI, while this proportion falls to 9.7% in the 2024-2025 AMPI.

The Government plans to use \$23.7 million of the planned investments under the 2024-2034 QIP to complete work targeting 64% of the AMD associated with public body infrastructure in poor and very poor condition (GCI of D or E).

The infrastructure portfolio for public bodies mainly consists of infrastructure for departments, government agencies, school service centres⁶, CEGEPs, universities⁷ and HSSN establishments. This portfolio, which has a replacement value of more than \$350.0 billion, includes:

- over 12,800 buildings, including schools and hospitals; and
- over 31,100 kilometres of roads and 9,900 bridges, tunnels and overpasses.

Taking into account the anticipated impact of the progressive increase strategy of infrastructure maintenance investments, the proportion of infrastructure in good condition could increase from 56% to 69% by March 2034.

The portfolio of subsidized bodies mainly includes the infrastructures of municipalities and public transit corporations. This portfolio, which has a replacement value of more than \$300.0 billion, includes:

- more than 100,000 kilometres of drinking water, storm drainage and wastewater pipes; and
- significant public transit infrastructure, including more than 500 kilometres of reserved lanes and commuter trains and Montréal Métro lines.

2.3 An investment strategy to improve public infrastructure condition

To progressively improve the proportion of infrastructure in good condition for public bodies, the Government continues to implement its strategy to gradually increase infrastructure maintenance investments.

 This strategy consists of increasing the infrastructure maintenance envelopes over a 10-year period to compensate for the shortfall between the investments planned in the QIP and the needs identified in the AMPIs, as well as maintaining the 10-year level of infrastructure maintenance of the previous QIP and indexing them.

For the 2024-2034 QIP, a record investment of \$87.6 billion is allocated to infrastructure maintenance, representing 62% of QIP investments, excluding the central envelope. This represents an increase of \$6.7 billion over the \$80.9 billion forecast in the 2023-2033 QIP, and \$29.1 billion over the 2018-2028 QIP.

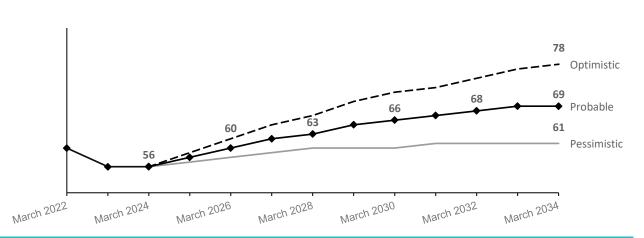
• This strategy has led to an increase in investments made annually in infrastructure maintenance investments. As a result, probable investments of \$9.9 billion in infrastructure maintenance for 2023-2024 are significantly higher than the \$5.3 billion made in 2018-2019, representing an increase of 87%.

A ten-year forecasting model has been developed to guide investment choices. The purpose of this modeling exercise is to determine how the expected effects of the infrastructure maintenance investment strategy are progressing and what adjustments are required, most particularly by identifying the repair or reconstruction projects required according to the life cycle of each infrastructure.

Thus, by anticipating the effect of the strategy for incrementally increasing infrastructure maintenance investments over the next 10 QIPs, or by the 2034-2044 QIP, the results of the forecasting model indicate this strategy would result in an anticipated proportion of infrastructure in good condition for public bodies from 56% in March 2024 to 69% in March 2034.

- The proportion of infrastructure in good condition could reach 78% if, for example, infrastructure maintenance projects are completed more quickly than expected.
- the proportion of infrastructure in good condition could be 61% if, for example, the deterioration rate of infrastructure or inflation were higher than expected.

Since these are models, the convincing results obtained will continue to be refined in future QIPs and could therefore vary over time. The results obtained could vary, depending of the update on the condition assessment of the infrastructure in the AMPIs, a deterioration of infrastructure that is different from what is expected, the investment choices made by the departments and bodies and their capacity to complete the work planned, as well as the construction industry's capacity to respond.

Finally, functional renovations to existing infrastructure to adequately meet the changing needs of clients require the use of planned investments in infrastructure maintenance investments. Although these transformations are necessary, they generally do not improve the physical condition of an infrastructure, and could therefore have an impact on the forecast results predicted by the predictive model.

Appendix 1 – Elaboration of the 2024-2034 QIP

The annual development of the QIP takes into account the progress of ongoing projects, the needs expressed by the government departments and bodies, and government priorities. Starting with the previous year's plan, the following factors are considered.

Changes during 2023-2024 (first year of the previous QIP)

The starting point of the 2024-2034 QIP differs from the published 2023-2033 QIP. In fact, in order to reflect the transactions that occurred in 2023-2024, the following elements must be taken into account to update the 2023-2033 QIP, namely:

- The decisions of the Cabinet in 2023-2024. For all major projects that the Cabinet has approved for the current year, funds allocated to these projects are transferred from the central envelope to the sector envelopes for the departments and bodies responsible for these projects;
- Changes in the cost or contribution of partners on certain projects, which resulted in adjustments to the planned government contribution;
- Amounts released as a result of project progress and completion, which become available for further investments;
- Withdrawal of the first year of the 2023-2033 QIP, that is, 2023-2024.

Consequently, the result of these operations made it possible to determine the balance available from sector envelopes and the central envelope at the start of 2024-2034 QIP preparation.

Preparation of the 2024-2034 QIP

As a first step, a new year (2033-2034) is added to the QIP for an amount equivalent to that allocated for the year withdrawn (2023-2024) from the previous QIP, or \$16.7 billion, to keep the 10-year level of investments constant.

For the year added, a portion of the investments is allocated, with high priority to the strategy of gradually increasing infrastructure maintenance investments to ensure sustainability (\$10.0 billion). After this allocation, the undistributed balance for 2033-2034 is available for new initiatives (\$6.9 billion, taking into account the balance of the provision for contingencies in the 2023-2033 QIP of \$219.5 million), plus amounts reallocated from the central envelope (\$409.2 million).

Every year, the Government determines the level of investment in the QIP based on identified needs and government priorities, while taking into account the impact these investments have on public finances (increase of \$3.0 billion).

Finally, the Government distributes all of the available \$10.3 billion (available balance of \$6.9 billion, \$409.2 million reallocated from the central envelope, and an increase of \$3.0 billion) either to sector envelopes to implement projects under the responsibility of various departments and bodies, or to the central envelope to set aside the funds that will be needed to carry out major projects in the future.

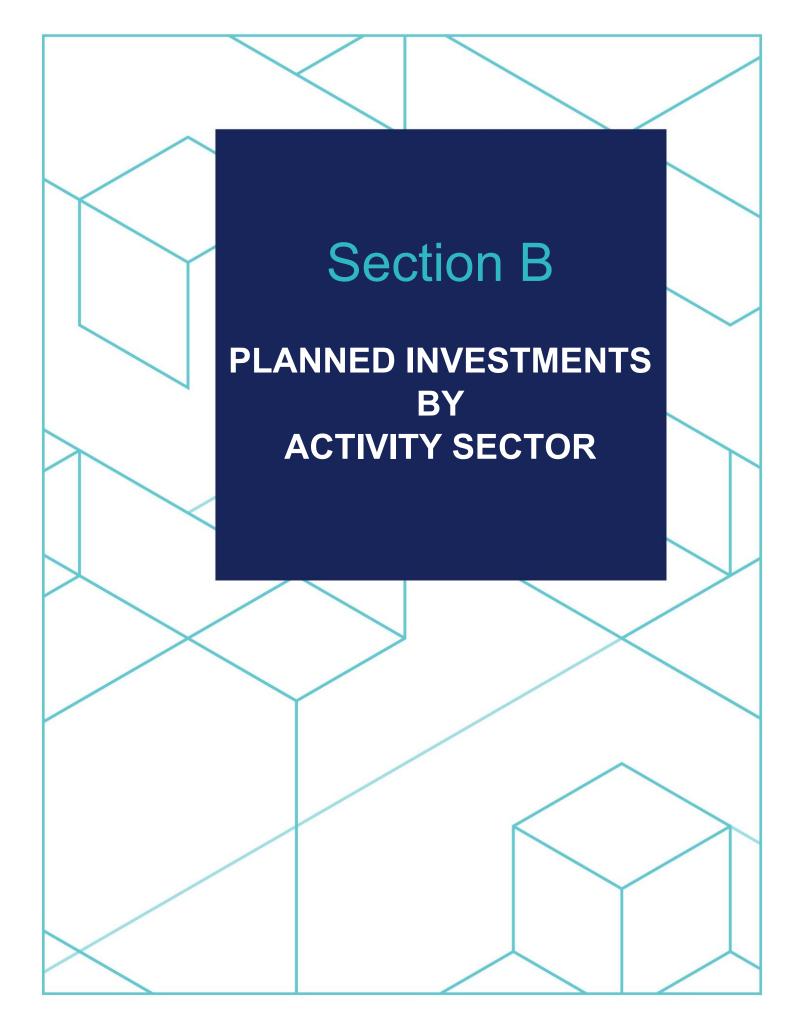
Appendix 3 – Directive sur la gestion des projets majeurs d'infrastructure publique

As previously mentioned, changes will be made to the Directive to facilitate and accelerate the project authorization process.

The Directive applies to the departments and bodies responsible for major projects, and is designed to
enable the Government to promote best practices in project management and monitor the main
parameters (cost, schedule, scope and funding) of the projects it funds.

Currently, the Directive applies to infrastructure projects with an estimated cost of \$50.0 million or more, in the case of real estate projects, or \$100.0 million or more, in the case of road projects. Pursuant to a decision made by the Conseil du trésor in July 2019, public transit projects are also subject to the Directive.

- For a project to be considered under study in the QIP, a preliminary project sheet must be prepared to explain how the project will address a particular need. Based on the priority assigned, the Cabinet approves, where applicable, the preliminary project sheet, and the project moves to the "under study" phase;
- While a project is under study phase, an opportunity case must be prepared to assess the project's
 relevance and ensure that the selected option is the best one for meeting the identified need and
 requirements. On completion of this study, the Cabinet approves the opportunity case, if applicable, and
 the project is authorized as "in planning";
- While a project is in planning, a business case must be developed. This document should detail the selected option and outline its management plan. Once planning is complete, the Cabinet approves the business case, where warranted, and the project is then "in progress";
- While a project is in progress, summary progress reports must be prepared for March 31 and September 30 of each year and submitted to the Sous-secrétariat aux infrastructures publiques of the SCT. Meanwhile, the Cabinet must authorize any substantial changes to the project's scope, schedule, funding or cost.
- For a project to be deemed operational, the infrastructure built, replaced or rehabilitated must be providing full service (or partial service in the case of phased commissioning). Nevertheless, some work, acquisitions or dispute settlements may still be underway.
- At closing, all work must have been completed to the satisfaction of the client (in most cases, the MTMD or the SQI), and the project must have been fully operational for at least a year, allowing for formal delivery. A closing report must then be sent to the Sous-secrétariat aux infrastructures publiques of the SCT. Nevertheless, some work, acquisitions or dispute settlements may still be underway.

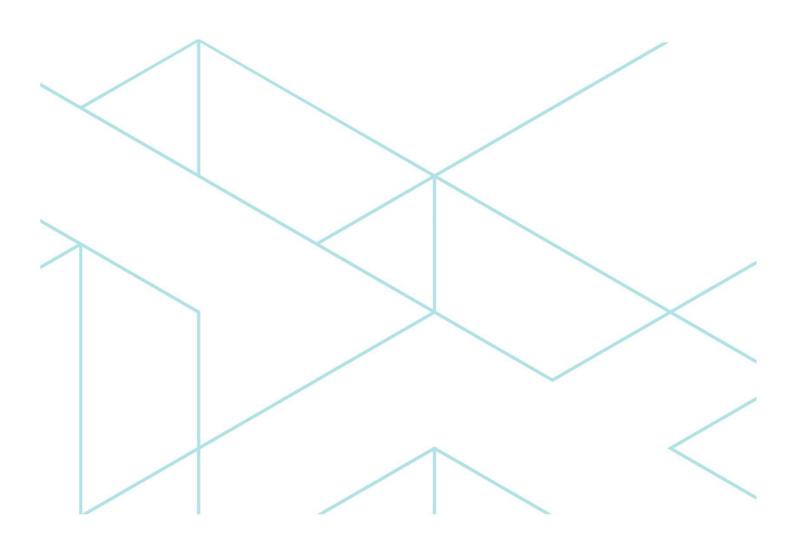

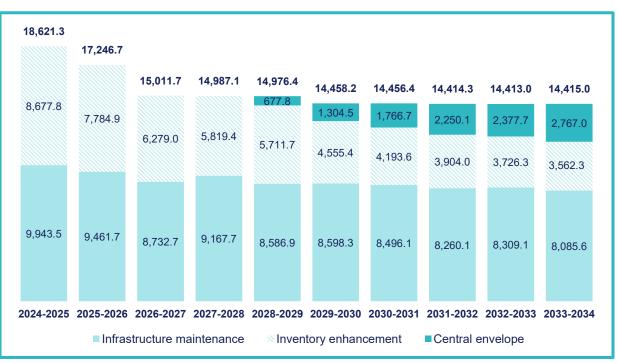

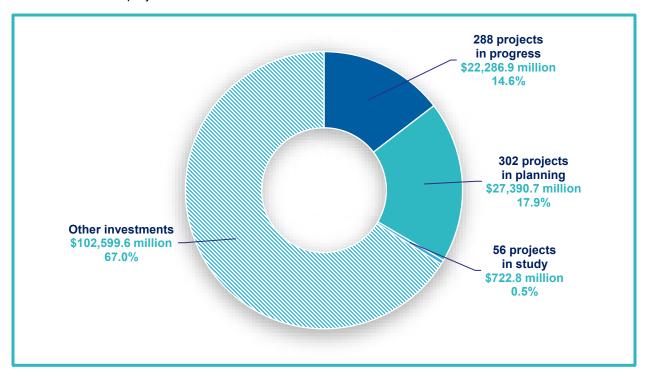

Planned investments included in the 2024-2034 QIP are divided into 19 major sectors of government activity.

- 1. Government administration: office buildings, courthouses, detention facilities, Sûreté du Québec police stations, movable and immovable property acquired by government departments and bodies
- 2. Agriculture, forests and fauna: agricultural training and research facilities, multi-resource roads on public land
- 3. Culture: museums, libraries, performance halls, cultural complexes
- 4. Development of sport: sports complexes and equipment
- 5. Development of the northern territory and Indigenous nations: infrastructure funded by the Société du Plan Nord, digital infrastructure across Québec, Indigenous community infrastructure
- 6. Economic development: development of land with high attraction potential, collective entrepreneurship
- 7. Education: buildings and equipment of school service centres²
- 8. Higher education: buildings and equipment of CEGEPs and universities
- **9.** Environment: biomethanization and composting plants, public and municipal dams, as well as infrastructure for mitigating risks associated with coastal erosion and submergence and climate change
- **10.** Social and community housing: rental housing buildings
- **11.** Municipalities: drinking water and wastewater treatment plants, water and sewer lines, parks and municipal infrastructure, adapting to climate change program
- **12.** Research: laboratories, research equipment and centres
- **13.** Road network: autoroutes, roads, tunnels, bridges, interchanges and overpasses
- **14.** Information resources: information resource development and equipment in the various government departments and bodies as well as in the health and social services, education and higher education networks
- 15. Health and social services: institutions in the health and social services network
- 16. Educational childcare services: childcare centre establishments

² In addition to the 61 school service centres, there are 11 school boards.

- 17. Tourism and recreational activities: tourism facilities and complexes, conferences centres, national park facilities
- **18.** Public transit: métro, buses, commuter trains, tramways, platforms, stations, garages, maintenance centres, reserved lanes, tunnels, railways
- **19.** Marine, air, rail and other transportation: ferries, wharves, stations, airports, railways, local roads, rest stops, government vehicle fleet

The following pages present, for each of the 19 activity sectors, a summary table of 2024-2034 QIP investments by year, shared between infrastructure maintenance and enhancement, a diagram illustrating this breakdown, and a summary table showing the breakdown between investments in infrastructure projects of \$20.0 million or more, and investments in other projects and envelopes.

Authorized and announced projects with an estimated cost equal to or greater than \$20.0 million for which investments are planned in the 2024-2034 QIP are presented in the Detailed list of infrastructure projects attached to the 2024-2034 QIP³.

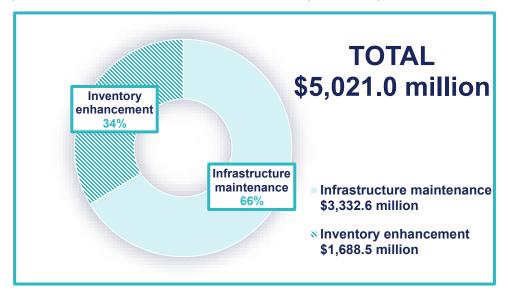

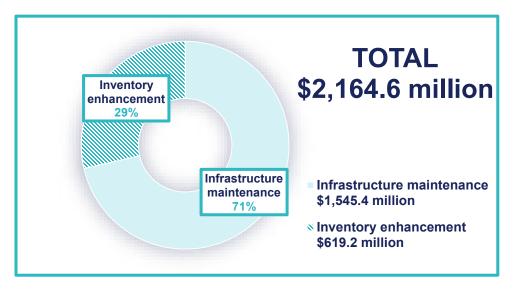

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1. A long-term vision of investment needs for government infrastructure maintenance

To assess and continually monitor the condition of the public infrastructure portfolio and the AMD, the Government has developed a GCI to establish and plan investment priorities in order to ensure infrastructure sustainability.

The indicator, which is based on best infrastructure investments management practices, provides a comprehensive, comparative and relative basis for assessing the condition of various categories of infrastructure. The primary basis is quantitative, that is, an evaluation of investment needs required in the next five years for each existing infrastructure. It is then combined with a risk management approach focusing on the infrastructure's service potential. Thus, the GCI provides guidance for the level of recurring investment required in the QIP to ensure infrastructure maintenance.

The GCI introduces five possible conditions, ranging from very good to very poor, as well as a threshold below which infrastructure is no longer deemed in satisfactory condition. When the condition of an infrastructure drops below this threshold, it generally entails an AMD. Infrastructure classified as D or E does not mean that it is unsafe, but that maintenance work is required before it can be considered again in a satisfactory condition.

For example, when assessing the condition of buildings, most Departments and bodies use the facility condition index¹ to assess their condition. According to this method, infrastructure whose asset maintenance needs exceed 15% of its replacement value would be assessed as being in poor condition (GCI of D), and when this proportion is over 30%, it would be assessed as being in very poor condition (GCI of E).

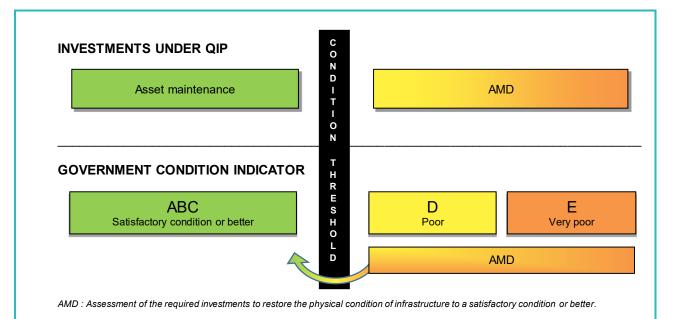

The AMD represents an estimate of the value of investments required to restore the infrastructure to a satisfactory or better condition or to replace it. Regardless of the condition of the infrastructure, the body responsible for it must ensure that the health and safety of individuals are not compromised, failing which, the infrastructure must be decommissioned. The GCI and the AMD help guide the Government's choices in the making of the QIP.



2. Highlights of the 2024-2025 AMPIs

2.1 Majority of infrastructure deemed in good condition

56% of the infrastructure of public bodies is deemed in good condition

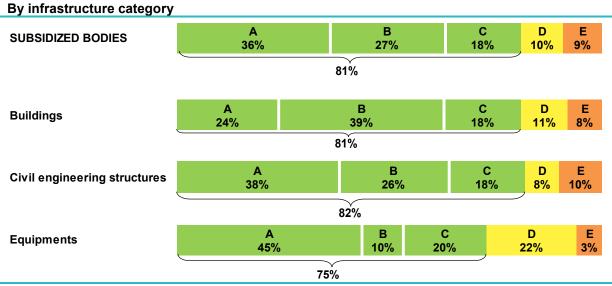
Overall, 56% of infrastructure under the responsibility of public bodies is deemed to be in satisfactory or better condition (GCI of A, B or C).

Overall, 81% of infrastructure under the responsibility of subsidized bodies is deemed to be in satisfactory or better condition (GCI of A, B or C).

2.2 56% of the infrastructure of public bodies is deemed in good condition

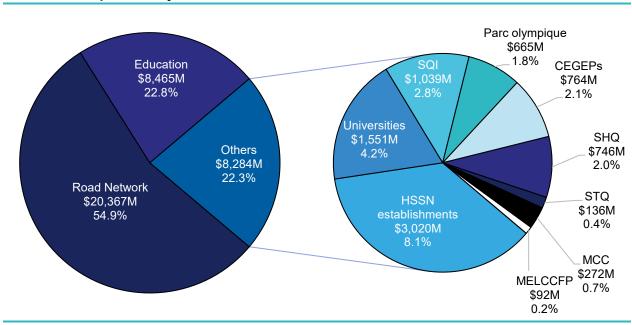
Overall, 56% of infrastructure under the responsibility of public bodies is deemed to be in satisfactory or better condition (GCI of A, B or C). Compared to the 2023-2024 AMPI, the strategy of progressively increasing infrastructure maintenance investments has made it possible to stabilize the proportion of infrastructure of public organizations in good condition.

2.3 The asset maintenance deficit is assessed at \$37.1 billion

In 2024-2025, the AMD of government infrastructure stands at \$37.1 billion and is attributable to:

- The road network sector (55%);
- The education sector (23%);
- Other sectors (22%).

It is incumbent upon each public body designated by the Government to develop an AMPI to assess the AMD. Since the infrastructures of subsidized bodies are not owned by the Gouvernement du Québec, subsidized bodies are responsible for maintaining them, including the AMD. Consequently, the AMD of subsidized bodies is not considered in that of public bodies under the responsibility of the Government.



Distribution of public body AMD

The change in the AMD has three main causes: the natural deterioration of infrastructure over its useful life, including the increased cost of cumulative work not done during the year, new work identified in recent inspections and investments made to reduce the AMD during the period.

□ AMD increase of \$2.2 billion

Compared to last year's AMD of \$34.9 billion, an increase in AMD of \$2.2 billion is observed between the 2023-2024 AMPI and the 2024-2025 AMPI. This increase is due to three factors:

- The natural deterioration of infrastructure, which contributed to a \$2.7 billion increase in the AMD, including mainly:
 - An amount of \$1.6 billion related to the aging of buildings, particularly those in the education network and the health and social services network, including a significant upward revision in the cost of work to be carried out due to inflation reflecting construction market conditions;
 - An amount of \$1.1 billion related to the natural aging of roadways and road network structures.
- A net increase of \$2.0 billion resulting from new asset maintenance work listed during the period and a downward revision in the scope of work required to correct deficiencies reported on roadways in poor and very poor condition (CGI of D or E);
- Work carried out during the period reduced accumulated needs by \$2.5 billion, including mainly:
 - An amount of \$1.6 billion for repair work, reconstruction and critical component upgrades, notably on buildings in the education, health and social services, higher education and social and community housing sectors;
 - An amount of \$0.9 billion for repair work, reconstruction and correction of deficiencies on road infrastructure.

3. The 2024-2025 AMPIs

Since 2015–2016, the AMPI of bodies designated by the government have reported on the inventory and condition of most of the infrastructure under their responsibility. The implementation of AMPIs marks the first stage in a government-wide approach aimed at ensuring optimum planning of infrastructure investments included in the QIP, bearing in mind the necessity for a balance between infrastructure maintenance and development needs, while respecting Quebecers' ability to pay.
