Mr. Tanguay, Official Opposition House Leader, together with Mr. Arseneau (Îles-de-la-Madeleine), moved a motion on certain commitments of the Government; this motion could not be debated for want of unanimous consent.

Government Bills

Report Stage

The Assembly took into consideration the report from the Committee on Labour and the Economy on its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill 11, An Act to amend various provisions for the main purpose of reducing regulatory and administrative burden, together with the amendment transmitted by Mr. Bernard, Minister for the Economy and Small and Medium Enterprises.

The amendment was declared in order.

After debate thereon, the amendment was carried on division.

The amended report was concurred in on division.

The Assembly took into consideration the report from the Committee on Citizen Relations on its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill 12, An Act to establish the provision of educational childcare by recognized persons responsible for a community educational childcare service.

After debate thereon, the report was concurred in.

The Assembly took into consideration the report from the Committee on Culture and Education on its clause-by-clause consideration of Bill 10, An Act to protect consumers against abusive practices in ticket reselling and online subscription renewal.

After debate thereon, the report was concurred in.

9 June 2026

Passage in Principle

Mr. Roberge, Minister of the French Language, moved that Bill 2, An Act to enable the Parliament of Québec to preserve the principle of parliamentary sovereignty with respect to the Charter of the French language and the Act respecting French, the official and common language of Québec, do now pass in principle.

After debate thereon, the question was put on this motion, and an electronic division was thereupon demanded.

At the request of Mr. Lévesque, Minister for the Regions, the division was deferred until Routine Proceedings on the next sitting day.

Mr. Bernard, Minister for the Economy and Small and Medium Enterprises, moved that Bill 17, An Act mainly to amend the Act respecting natural gas storage and natural gas and oil pipelines in order to provide a framework for underground reservoirs and certain pipelines, do now pass in principle.

A debate arose thereon.

At 6:00 p.m., Mr. Benjamin, Third Vice-President, suspended the proceedings until 7:30 p.m.

The proceedings resumed at 7:30 p.m.

The Assembly continued the debate on the motion moved by Mr. Bernard, Minister for the Economy and Small and Medium Enterprises, that Bill 17, An Act mainly to amend the Act respecting natural gas storage and natural gas and oil pipelines in order to provide a framework for underground reservoirs and certain pipelines, do now pass in principle.

The debate being concluded, the motion was carried, and Bill 17 was accordingly passed in principle.

9 June 2026

Ms. Lachance, Deputy Government House Leader, moved that Bill 17 be referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Fisheries, Energy and Natural Resources for clause-by-clause consideration.

The motion was carried.

Government Motions

The Assembly held the debate on the motion that arose from the tabling of the Convention on the International Recovery of Child Support and Other Forms of Family Maintenance, on 24 March 2026, by the Minister of International Relations and La Francophonie.

This motion reads as follows:

THAT the National Assembly approve the Convention on the International Recovery of Child Support and Other Forms of Family Maintenance tabled on 24 March 2026.

Mr. Benjamin, Third Vice-President, informed the Assembly of the allocation of speaking time with respect to this limited debate: 49 minutes 30 seconds to the parliamentary group forming the Government; 27 minutes to the parliamentary group forming the Official Opposition; 16 minutes 50 seconds to the Second Opposition Group; 11 minutes 40 seconds to the Third Opposition Group; and 1 minute 30 seconds to each independent Member. Within this framework, any time not used by the independent Members or by a parliamentary group shall be redistributed among the parliamentary groups in the proportions established above. Lastly, individual addresses shall not be limited.

After debate thereon, the motion was carried. Accordingly, this commitment was approved.
