Complaints of Breach of Privilege or Contempt and Personal Explanations

Mr. President rendered his decision regarding the point of privilege raised by the Official Opposition House Leader, on 29 March 2011, whereby he alleged that the Minister of Labour, during a speech in the Assembly, had been in contempt of Parliament by threatening Members sitting in opposition or by trying to influence them in the exercise of their duties.

RULING FROM THE CHAIR

During her address on the Budget Speech on 24 March 2011, the Minister of Labour made certain comments. After this address, still within the framework of the debate on the Budget Speech, the Member for Joliette rose and commented on the words used by the Minister. The latter then gave a brief explanation in pursuance of Standing Order 212 regarding the words she had used.

When the Chair interprets words used in the Assembly, it must take all facts into consideration.

Under the circumstances, the Minister invoked the provisions of Standing Order 212. This Standing Order is a procedural tool that allows a Member to explain the sense of the speech he has just given. In other words, this Standing Order allows a Member to set the facts straight in regard to some part of his speech that he deems may have been misquoted or misunderstood.

When a Member invokes Standing Order 212, his explanations cannot be called into question and must be considered as true. Furthermore, this falls within the reasoning behind the principle whereby no Member may refuse to take another Member at his word.

The Chair therefore cannot conclude that the comments made by the Minister of Labour within the framework of the debate on the Budget Speech constitute, at first glance, contempt of Parliament.

However, all speeches made in this Assembly are recorded in the *Journal des débats*. It is also important to recall the importance of the constitutional privilege of freedom of speech, in pursuance of which a Member may not be influenced, threatened or hindered in the exercise of his parliamentary duties.

At the request of Mr. President, Mr. Fournier, Government House Leader, withdrew certain words deemed unparliamentary.
